Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We begin this month with the celebration of Holy Trinity Sunday. This is a day set aside for us to consider the mystery of the divine Trinity, God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. And to help us in this reflection on the Trinity, many churches recite in some form the Athanasian Creed (aka the long creed). This creed tries in various ways to teach and summarize our belief about the Trinity and the person of Jesus Christ.

Creeds have been used this way throughout the ages. Each of our three creeds addresses different aspects of our belief. In the Apostles' Creed, we focus on the basics of the faith passed down to us by the apostles. In the Nicene Creed, some aspects of the person and work of Christ are dealt with due to a disagreement that was resolved at the Council of Nicea. And as mentioned above, the Athanasian Creed helps to explain our believe in the Trinity.

This covers what the creeds are and their purpose, but why do we recite them so often? Why have our confirmands memorize one? I believe St Paul summarizes it quite well in 1 Thessalonians 2 where we read,

“For our appeal does not spring from error or impurity or any attempt to deceive, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please man, but to please God who tests our hearts.” - 1 Thess. 2:3-4

We speak not to please men but to please God. We confess this faith together so that we might be equipped to confess this saving gospel to a world that needs to hear it.

I am also drawn the words of St Paul in 2 Corinthians 4.

“Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, “I believed, and so I spoke,” we also believe, and so we also speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence. For it is all for your sake, so that as grace extends to more and more people it may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.” - 2 Cor. 4:13-15

We believe and so we speak. St Paul makes it clear why we confess together it is because of the faith that we share. This faith compels us to speak so that we may bring glory to God as we give thanks to Him for all that He has done for us and taught us.

As God's children, we are encouraged to be ready to speak of our faith, as we heard recently in church from St Peter,

“but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect” - 1 Pet. 3:15

And the creeds provide us with a ready answer for the hope that is in us. They serve as a simple (or in the case of the Athanasian Creed, the best we can manage) explanation of what we believe about God and what He has done for us.

Finally, we have this last encouragement from Christ himself in John 3,

“Truly, truly, I say to you, we speak of what we know, and bear witness to what we have seen, but you do not receive our testimony.” - John 3:11

Here Jesus is talking specifically to Nicodemus but His encouragement is for us all: to speak of what we know and bear witness to what we have seen. We know thee salvation Christ has won for us. We have seen as He washes, feeds, forgives, and cares for His children. Knowing these things, we are encouraged to speak of them whenever we can. So no matter what Sunday it is, Trinity Sunday and a time for the Athanasian Creed, communion Sunday and a time for the Nicene Creed, or some other day and you're reciting the Apostles' Creed, may we boldly speak of what we know that we may give glory to God for what He has done for us.

Red completes the acronym, “Bg-Bgs-Pwr.” Red is a power color and is appropriate for use on Pentecost Sunday. On this day we remember the power and fire of “the Lord and Giver of Life,” who revealed himself as the promised one. The color red communicates the motif of strength-strength and power the Holy Spirit gives in order for God's people to call on the name of Jesus Christ and share that powerful name with others.

There is no question that red is a compelling festive color. Consequently, it serves well as the traditional color for the heroic martyrs of the church. The *Lutheran Service Book* church year calendar provides propers for sixteen martyr festivals and recommends red as the appropriate color. Their red blood shed in defense of the Gospel offers perpetual encouragement for God's people to be resolute in living the faith.

Additional uses of red are Reformation Sunday; Holy Cross Day (Sept. 14); on such festive occasions as dedications, anniversaries of a congregation and its physical structure; festive days celebrating the office of the public ministry, such as ordination and installation.

White is the color of purity and completeness. The theme for the “great fifty days” of Easter is supported by the use of white. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, assists in bearing the message that “though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow.” Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy.

In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in *Lutheran Service Book*. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.

Green, comes next in the acronym and is by far the most common color seen during the year.

Lutheran Service Book calls for its use during the seasons of Epiphany and Pentecost. The first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21), also known as Easter Sunday, determines the length of these two seasons. The days of Epiphany may entail a total of, but not more than, eight Sundays. The season of Pentecost, on the other hand, can last from 22 to 28 Sundays. Green is the appointed color for all but a few of the Sundays during these seasons. Consequently, green may be used an average of six to eight months of any given liturgical year!

St. Matthew Honors their High School Graduates




We honored our high school graduates on Sunday, May 21, 2023 thanking God for their accomplishments and continued blessings on them.
