> Sermon Title: Living According to God's Promises Sermon Text: Luke 2:40-52

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

We are now in the second and last Sunday of the Christmas season. Today is the 10<sup>th</sup> Day of Christmas. Epiphany is three days from now on Wednesday. Last Sunday we talked about what Joseph and Mary did according to the Law of Moses. They took baby Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem and offered the required sacrifice, and they had baby Jesus circumcised according to the Law of Moses written in Exodus and Leviticus.

Now, we jump ahead several years, and meet up with Jesus as a child, who is 12 years old. <sup>40</sup> And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. And the favor of God was upon him. <sup>41</sup> Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the Feast of the Passover. <sup>42</sup> And when he was twelve years old, they went up according to custom." (Luke 2:40-42)

The yearly celebration of the Passover was a required event of all Israelites. Everyone was to travel to Jerusalem where they would offer a lamb sacrifice as part of the Passover celebration. Back in Deuteronomy 16 God explains the Passover sacrifice:

"You may not offer the Passover sacrifice within any of your towns that the LORD your God is giving you, but at the place that the LORD your God will choose, to make his name dwell in it, there you shall offer the Passover sacrifice, in the evening at sunset, at the time you came out of Egypt." (Deuteronomy 16:5-6)

And then several verses later in the Deuteronomy 16, we see how God says at least every man from every family is required to attend the three festivals throughout the year. "*Three times a year all your males shall appear before the LORD your God at the place that he will choose: at the Feast of Unleavened Bread, at the Feast of Weeks, and at the Feast of Booths. They shall not appear before the LORD empty-handed. Every man shall give as he is able, according to the blessing of the LORD your God that he has given you.*" (Deuteronomy 16:16-17)

So we know that every year, at least Joseph would travel to Jerusalem, though Mary and Jesus also probably went with him. Males were required to attend the three festivals throughout the year. Their families were invited to attend, but were not required.

In addition to these biblical requirements to attend the annual festivals, there is significance in Luke mentioning that Jesus was 12 years old. According to Jewish tradition, "When the boy Jesus was twelve years old, the parents followed the rule laid down by the elders that the sons must be trained in the observance of all religious duties and must take part in the festivals with their elders."

Twelve years old "was the age at which the Jewish boys entered the secondary school, the Beth-ha-Midrash, the foremost of which was located at Jerusalem and usually conducted in one of the Temple halls." (Popular Commentary of the Bible: New Testament Vol. 1: Kretzman, p. 277)

So in our Gospel lesson from Luke, we see Joseph, Mary and the boy Jesus are in Jerusalem celebrating this annual festival of the Passover. Jesus is also beginning to learn how to observe the Passover celebration along with the other festivals.

Later in Luke's Gospel, in Luke chapter 22, we read more about the Passover celebration. The Passover celebration is the festival that Jesus changed into our current practice of Holy Communion. The Passover festival was a week celebrating how God saved his people in Egypt and brought them safely into the Promised Land of Israel.

<sup>(43</sup> And when the feast was ended, as they were returning, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His parents did not know it, <sup>44</sup> but supposing him to be in the group they went a day's journey, but then they began to search for him among their relatives and acquaintances, <sup>45</sup> and when they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem, searching for him." (Luke 2:43-45)

Some folks have asked how Mary and Joseph could not have known where their child was as they traveled home. It's a valid question. In those days, extended families would travel together from their hometowns to Jerusalem to celebrate the festivals required by God in the Old Testament. Joseph and Mary would have known when they left that Jesus was with them. Jesus would have been hanging out with cousins and other relatives his age, lagging behind their parents, just as kids do today.

So it wasn't that Joseph and Mary were negligent and lost their child. They were simply traveling with their extended families as most people traveled in those days for temples festivals. Joseph and Mary figured that Jesus was hanging out with other kids, and so they headed towards home.

Then, somewhere in this journey, maybe as they were preparing to stop for the night, Joseph and Mary started looking for their son, but they couldn't find him. *but then they began to search for him among their relatives and acquaintances*, <sup>45</sup> and when they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem, searching for him."

Since none of their relatives, who they were traveling with, had seen Jesus or knew his whereabouts, they concluded that Jesus was still in Jerusalem. So they quickly headed back to the capital city to find their only child.

By now, Joseph and Mary were obviously worried and very concerned about their child's whereabout and wellbeing. Any parent would react the same way. "<sup>46</sup> After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. <sup>47</sup> And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers." (Luke 2:46-47)

After searching for three days for their lost child, Joseph and Mary were probably leaning on being hysterical. Where on earth is Jesus!?!?!? Scripture tells us that they looked for their son for three days. Now, you have to understand that they didn't cell phones or texting options. They simply had to ask everyone who they met, if they had seen their son. Joseph and Mary repeating the same description of their lost son to many different people. Also, Jerusalem was a big city which hindered Joseph and Mary as they searched for their boy.

But let's flip over to where Jesus is, and see how things are going with him in the temple.

<sup>46</sup> After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. <sup>47</sup> And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers." (Luke 2:46-47)

Jesus was sitting with the rabbis, the men, who taught the meaning of the Scriptures to the people. Even at 12 years old, Jesus appears to these rabbis as a promising teacher at such a young age.

Back in verse 40, we see how Jesus as a 12-year-old boy, is able to engage highly educated Bible teachers, with his own thoughts and questions, just as these older men were doing. <sup>40</sup> And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. And the favor of God was upon him."

Scripture teaches us that the Messiah will be endowed with wisdom from the Holy Spirit. And we know this is what was happening as Jesus engages the Bible teachers of his time with his own spiritual questions and ideas.

When Joseph and Mary finally find their son, they are naturally upset. "<sup>48</sup> And when his parents saw him, they were astonished. And his mother said to him, 'Son, why have you treated us so? Behold, your father and I have been searching for you in great distress.' <sup>49</sup> And he said to them, 'Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' <sup>50</sup> And they did not understand the saying that he spoke to them." (Luke 2:48-50)

And yet, Jesus does not respond in anger or frustration. He simply talks to them as though they completely understand the relationship of Jesus with God our Heavenly Father. Of course, at that moment they don't get it. <sup>49</sup> And [Jesus] said to them, 'Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' <sup>50</sup> And they did not understand the saying that he spoke to them." (Luke 2:48-50)

When Joseph and Mary finally find their son, after they had been looking for him for three days, they are probably frustrated and relieved. They finally found their son, who was lost. They find Jesus in the temple courts sitting calm and confident engaging the rabbis with biblical and spiritual questions.

<sup>49</sup> And [Jesus] said to them, 'Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' <sup>50</sup> And they did not understand the saying that he spoke to them." (Luke 2:48-50)

Here we see Jesus as a 12-year-old boy publicly confessing, who he is, the Son of God Most High. Son of God our Heavenly Father.

Jesus says that he must be in his Father's house, tending to his Father's business, that business of being filled up with the truth from God's Word, and then going out and sharing that Good News with other people.

So Joseph and Mary found Jesus sitting with the rabbis in the temple. The rabbis were regularly holding classes in the temple halls—areas outside of the actual temple courts—for young boys, who had just turned 12 years old, and for older kids, who were high school aged. The rabbis were teaching the basics of the Jewish faith to the younger boys, who were Jesus age, up to the more advanced biblical topics for high school age boys. This is where Joseph and Mary found Jesus sitting with other kids.

<sup>(151</sup> And he went down with them and came to Nazareth and was submissive to them. And his mother treasured up all these things in her heart. <sup>52</sup> And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man." (Luke 2:51-52)

Here we see another example of Jesus showing true humility. First, Jesus showed the entire world humility by willingly being born of a virgin, to live the exact same life as you and me. Now, as a 12-year-old boy, Jesus shows true humility by obeying his parents, by doing what the Fourth Commandment says: *"Honor your father and mother."* 

Jesus not only lived according to the Fourth Commandment, but he lived according to ALL the commandments. Jesus did this to show us that with God's help, it is very possible to do what God asks of us. Now, granted, you and I will fall short often trying to live the way God wants us to live, but that's where confession and absolution come in.

Psalm 32 gives us a short example for confessing our sins and receiving God's forgiveness: *"I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the LORD, 'and you forgave the iniquity of my sin."* (Psalm 32:5) Simply pray and tell God what you have done against him and against someone else, and then tell God you're truly sorry, and God will forgive you. That's what he promises.

Jesus, as a 12-year-old boy, lived according to the Ten Commandments and according to the traditions of his culture at that time. He did this so that he can then take your sins and mine onto himself, and then be hung on a cross to die a horrible death so that you and I don't have to die. Then, by God the Father's glorious power, Jesus was raised again from the dead three days later. His death means that he has overcome sin, death and the devil. This is reason enough to praise and thank the Lord our God. Amen.

## PARAMENTS ON OUR ALTAR:

**Color is everywhere**. Color is God's way of filling his world with beauty and giving pleasure to those who live in this colorful world. Christians, for centuries, have used color in divine worship to emphasize the redemptive action of God through his Son. Color's Purpose However, color and its bright message can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners, traditionally employed each Sunday, must be seen as more than an attempt to decorate, or give accent to the chancel. That is, no doubt, the view of some. It's true; interior design and decoration are important. But a greater service is demanded of our liturgical colors than merely making the surroundings "pretty." Furthermore, when altar paraments are used year after year without much attention given to their message, as well as their care, the pastor, along with his faithful altar guild would do well to throw away the key to the sacristy and refrain from using those altar cloth "decorations." Frequent instruction about the church year and its corresponding colors must go hand in hand with its weekly use

**Color, like music**, plays an important role in the life of God's worshiping people. Just as music is the "handmaiden to theology," liturgical color complements the message of the seasons and occasions during the church year. Taking a familiar seat in the nave of his/her chapel preceding worship on any given Sunday, the worshiper's emotions and intellect are immediately engaged by color. Liturgical colors aid in establishing a climate in which Law and Gospel may be heard and received.

Color allows us to see the Light of Life, Jesus Christ. It serves to communicate the message of salvation. And communicate it does when it reinforces a specific "colorful" chapter in the life of our Lord and his church, retold annually by the church calendar.

**Symbolism of Colors** It is appropriate, from time to time, to take a thoughtful and fresh look at the colors that are displayed throughout the church year. In the end, we admit, the use of paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners is an adiaphoron. Even the symbolism behind the traditional colors is somewhat arbitrary and open to additional interpretations as generations pass. The primary source and guarantor of their meanings is tradition. However, the important thing to remember is why we retain this traditional liturgical standard. The value of the "Bg-BgsPwr" color scheme rests in their purpose: to serve God's worshiping community by assisting in communicating the holy faith from generation to generation. In every age, the beauty and symbolism of color in the church continues to serve us exceptionally well!

White is the color of purity and completeness. The theme for the "great fifty days" of Easter is supported by the use of white. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, assists in bearing the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy. In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in *Lutheran Service Book*. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.
