St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA hemiah 8:1–3, 5–6, 8–10 / Psalm 19:(1–6) 7–14 / 1 Corinthians 12:12–31a / Luke 4:16–30

> Sermon Title: Suffering Together, Being Honored Together Sermon Text: 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

One thing I don't understand about church members—not just in this congregation, but many congregations, that I have visited—is how too many Christians seem to think—or act like they don't belong to the Body of Christ—that they are simply a member of a civic organization. The church isn't a civic organization. The church is the visible representation of the Body of Christ here on earth in this place of Mapleton, Iowa.

When you join our congregation or any LCMS congregation, you're saying that you believe what the LCMS teaches from the Bible. Once you "join the church," then Paul tells you what to do next—use the Spiritual gifts that God has nurtured in you to glorify God and to build of the Body of Christ here in Mapleton, Iowa. So, are you using your Spiritual gifts to the benefit of every other believer in our congregation?

Last Sunday we talked about Spiritual gifts which God gives to each believer according to what God knows that person needs. God does not give the same spiritual gifts to every believer. He gives the gift of teaching to some believers. He gives the gift of understanding finances to a couple of people. He gives different gifts to different people so that those people will use their spiritual gift to glorify God and to build up the Body of Christ.

If you're not using the Spiritual Gifts that God has given you, then why are you withholding your Spiritual Gift, and not using the to glorify God and to build up the Body of Christ. Paul tells us in our Epistle lesson this morning from First Corinthians chapter twelve the importance of acknowl-edging—and living as though you are a member of this Christian congregation here in Mapleton, Iowa.

<sup>(12</sup> For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup> For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. <sup>14</sup> For the body does not consist of one member but of many." (1 Corinthians 12:12-14)

When you were baptized in the Name of the Triune God, and you receive the Holy Spirit, then you have life in Christ Jesus. As a member of the Body of Christ, you have been joined to the Trinity, and you have been joined to the Body of Believers here in Mapleton, Iowa. "<sup>13</sup> For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. <sup>14</sup> For the body does not consist of one member but of many." (1 Corinthians 12:13-14)

Just as our physical bodies are made up of many parts—all different kinds of parts, which all

do some specific function—so the Body of Christ does not consist of just one person or position in this specific place.

<sup>(15</sup> If the foot should say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>16</sup> And if the ear should say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>17</sup> If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? <sup>18</sup> But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. <sup>19</sup> If all were a single member, where would the body be? <sup>20</sup> As it is, there are many parts, yet one body." (1 Corinthians 12:15-20)

If the whole church had only pastors, then that might be a little weird. Everyone knows that when pastors start talking, they might not be able to stop, which means a church full of pastors would last for hours, and no one wants that. If the whole church were made up of teachers for the children's Sunday School class, for the teen Bible study and for the Confirmation class, then who would the teachers be teaching—other teachers?!?!?

Of course, we can go the other way—which is the point Paul is trying to make: "<sup>15</sup> If the foot should say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body, 'that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>16</sup> And if the ear should say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>17</sup> If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell?" (1 Corinthians 12:15-17)

If a church member said that he didn't have the Spiritual gift of serving in some capacity, and then that church member stopped attending worship, because he said he wasn't able to serve in any capacity, then he would simply stay home and pout!

That's kind of ridiculous. That's the point that Paul is making. If one church member defines, who she is based on what Spiritual Gift she doesn't have, then she is making a really bad comparison. God brings every single believer to this congregation, who he wants to be here.

Now, it's unfortunate, that some believers got mad and stormed out without ever working to reconcile the problem. And there are some believers, who God has brought to our congregation, who have decided to stay home and away from the rest of the congregation for a variety of reasons.

That just means that the people, who have decided to stay home and watch the pastor preach a sermon online, are actually hurting themselves and hurting the rest of the congregation. *"If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together."* This isn't how God designed the local church—our church—as a representation of the Body of Christ here in Mapleton, Iowa. God desires all believers to use the gifts that he has given to glorify God and to build up the Body of Christ. Of course, the Body of Christ will struggle with all kinds of problems. Paul points out this fact in the next couple of verses:

<sup>(21</sup> The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' <sup>22</sup> On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup> and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, <sup>24</sup> which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, <sup>25</sup> that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one

another. <sup>26</sup> If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together." (1 Corinthians 12:21-26)

Think of what Paul is saying this way: I'm not young, so therefore I can't be an elder. I'm not young, so therefore I can't teach adult Bible class. I'm not young, so therefore I can't help. But my question to that is, why are you concluding what you can't do based on what you are not?

God has given ALL believers—every single member of this congregation—the gift or gifts that will glorify God and build up the Body of Christ. And every believer is important and necessary to this congregation. Of course, when some members stay away, they are only hurting themselves and the rest of us, because we are not receiving the blessings of that person's Spiritual Gift.

"But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, <sup>25</sup> that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. <sup>26</sup> If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together."

God knew who needs to belong to this congregation long before this building was ever built. God brought all the people here, who he has given a Spiritual Gift, so that person will use his spiritual gift to glorify God and build up the Body of Christ. And when we use our Spiritual Gifts the way God wants us to use them, then we are living according to the Second Greatest Commandment: Love your neighbor as yourself.

<sup>(27</sup>Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. <sup>28</sup>And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues." (1 Corinthians 12:27-28)

To wrap up this section, Paul then talks about specific gifts that God has given to members of the church—this congregation and all Bible-believing congregations. God made some believers to be apostles. An apostle is a believer, who is set apart to go and preach and teach the Good news of Jesus Christ to people, who don't believe in God. The first twelve men, who Jesus picked to follow him, were called apostles. They were also called disciples since they were learning from Jesus.

God then made some believers prophets and teachers. Prophets are believers, who are given a message by God the Holy Spirit to tell other people—sometimes the message is for other believers and sometimes the message is for unbelievers. And when God made some believers teachers, he's talking about men and women in the church, who have been give the gift of teaching and leading others in the truth from God's Word.

Paul then goes on to talk about God giving some believers the ability to perform miracles and to heal. Of course, all miracles and all healing comes from God alone. God sometimes gives some believers the opportunity for him to work through them so that unbelievers will see the miracle and hopefully give God all the glory and thanks for the miracle or healing.

God also gives some believers the gift of administration and various kinds of tongues. In the church, there is always a need for one or two believers, who have the gift of taking care of paper-work, being able to do computer work, being able to make bulletins and mailings for shut-ins, and so on.

And along with the gift of administration, God also gives some believers the ability to speak and/or understand different languages. In some areas of Iowa, there are pockets of people, who are from Mexico and Latin America, who are Sudan and other African nations, and who are from many other places around the world.

And God gives some believers the gift of being able to communicate with these non-native Englishspeaking people. After all, the Great Commission is all about going into all the world, and preaching and teaching about God and His Holy Word so that more people will know Jesus.

Paul then ends this section with some rhetorical questions: "Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? <sup>30</sup> Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? <sup>31</sup> But earnestly desire the higher gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way." (1 Corinthians 12:29-31a)

As I mentioned earlier, it would be ridiculous if the church was made up of only pastors—or made up of only teachers. Paul also points out that all believers do not have the same spiritual gifts—for a reason. God knows WHO needs WHAT spiritual gift in order to glorify God and to build up the Body of Christ. That's why the church is not made up of all apostles—and not made up of all prophets—and not all believers have the same spiritual gift.

Instead, Paul encourages all believers this way: <sup>31</sup> But earnestly desire the higher gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way." Paul wants all believers to seek Jesus and him alone, and let God take care of which spiritual gift he wants to give you.

So when Paul ends this section of chapter twelve, he wants the believers in Corinth to follow his example. And Paul says that he will then show the believers "...a still more excellent way." This excellent way he talks about in First Corinthians chapter thirteen. Paul begins chapter thirteen by talking about love being the most excellent way.

When Paul talks about love, he's talking about living out the Second Greatest Commandment: love your neighbor as yourself. And how do you love your neighbor as yourself? You treat your neighbor the way that you want to be treated. When you treat your neighbor the way you want to be treated, then you are loving your neighbor as yourself. And this is the most excellent way.

Seek the Lord while he may be found. Call upon him while he is near. To God be the glory now and forever. Amen. Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

#### **Our New Banner in Church.**

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful." (John 15: 1-2). These words are very important in the life of each Christian. Let us look more closely at the truth that Jesus Christ says: "I am the vine, you are the branches" (John 15: 5). Jesus the true vine. Let's take a closer look and analyze what is the vine and branches meaning in the Bible?

#### Vine and Branches Meaning: What is connection?

The first statement indicates an inseparable connection between the branches and the main vine. If we take it literally, then it turns out that we must be one with Jesus. With great reverence and fear, we must realize that Jesus calls us friends and has the greatest honor, allowing us to be branches on Him, as in a vine. Now we must conclude what we should be in our lives if we are branches of the vine of

Christ. It is unlikely that any of us have seen an apple tree, from the trunk of which would grow branches of nettle. This is impossible because of the heterogeneity of the plants, so having a great advantage, grow on the vine – we will match our own higher genus!

### Vine and Branches Meaning: Common Root

The second natural conclusion, which can be made from the words "I am the vine, and you are the branches," is the commonality of the root. Consequently, all the juices that enter through the root to the vine must pass to the branches. If you think about how this can reflect our everyday reality, then you can judge this. In our life, there are various events, and in daily life, we often face the need for choice. This verse from the Gospel of John shows that Jesus Christ and we should have common interests in everything: what is useful for the vine, it is also useful for the branches. After all, there is no such thing that the root feed on juices alone, and the tree crown is different. No, they have everything in common. Therefore, if you feel that your interests do not correspond to Christ, think, maybe you're not on the vine? Maybe you already is a wild branch, and have no relation to the beautiful plant of God?

### Vine and Branches Meaning: Necessary Pruning

The third and most important truth of Jesus' words is that "... every branch that brings forth fruit cleanses so that it will bear more fruit." In other words, if you are in the right condition and bear fruit for the kingdom of God, then necessary pruning is waiting for you. Many believe that the Lord realizes it with the help of hard and ruthless pruning down. Of course, it can not be denied that often such interference from above into our lives does not have effect as we would like. However, in no case should you think that God is pleased when we suffer! No! The Lord wants us to be more fruitful, so He does everything that is required of the gardener. But we also know that "... He will not let you be tempted beyond your strength" (1 Cor. 10: 13). Therefore, we will rejoice when the caring gardener shows his care, we know that He will not cause us unnecessary pain or unnecessary suffering. Glory be to Him for that!

## Vine and Branches Meaning: Bear Fruits

The fourth conclusion is that "If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15: 5). This is an extremely important detail! Some think that they can bear fruit, being somewhere outside Christ. To this is the unambiguous assertion of our Savior: "A branch can not bear fruit of itself." Immediately remember the words of Paul: "What do you have that you did not receive? If then you received it, why do you boast as if you did not receive it? "(1 Cor 4: 7). Any of our talents or abilities are from God and to Him. Let us devote ourselves to Him without a trace, realizing that if we have fruit in our Christian life, it is not our merit. By ourselves we could not bring anything. Being on the vine and eating from it, we bear fruit precisely because of it. Glory to Christ that He makes us able to produce fruit. And He still rewards for it as if it is our merit! Finally, I would like to appeal to those who do not belong to the church of the Lamb. And of course to those who are only a formal Christians. Such a sentence awaits: "If anyone does not abide in me he is thrown away like a branch and withers; and the branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned." (John 15: 6). Keep in mind that the particularly terrible situation is not for those who are not on the vine at all. This situation is for those who, being in a holy place, eating juices and posing as part of a vine – do not bear fruit! It is written, "Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away" (John 15: 2). How terrible it is to live a Christian life but don't be close to the Lord. Hearing the words "I never knew you", many will understand the insanity of fruitless finding on the vine, but it will be too late – they will be cut off and thrown into the fire. May God save us from this fate. Amen. www.bestforchrist.com/vine-and-branches-meaning-bible/
