

Sermon Title: Seek the Truth in Jesus. Sermon Text: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

One thing I really like about the Bible is how everything is connected. You can read some passage in the New Testament that is quoted from the Old Testament. Paul does that a lot in his letters. Many of these Old Testament passages that are quoted in the New Testament focus on Jesus, the Messiah, who was promised from the beginning of time.

If someone says that they don't see Jesus in the Old Testament, therefore we need to get rid of the Old Testament, then I'd say, you might as well get rid of the entire Bible. Why? Because Jesus is clearly pictured all throughout the Old and New Testaments.

Today's Old Testament lesson is one of the passages that clearly shows us Jesus in the Old Testament. Our text is taken from a sermon that Moses preached over three thousand four hundred years ago. We pick up the sermon in Deuteronomy chapter 18 beginning at verse 15:

"15 The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your brothers—it is to him you shall listen— 16 just as you desired of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly (see Deut. 9:10), when you said, 'Let me not hear again the voice of the Lord my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die.' (Ex. 20:18-21) 17 And the Lord said to me, 'They are right in what they have spoken. (Deut. 5:28) 18 I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their brothers. And I will put my words in his mouth (Jer. 1:9; 5:14), and he shall speak to them all that I command him." (Deuteronomy 18:15-18)

Here in Moses' sermon, he starts preaching about the coming of another prophet. "¹⁵ The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your brothers—it is to him you shall listen."

Moses doesn't say that this Prophet will magically appear one day. No, in fact Moses preaches that this Prophet will come from among the current population of the Israelites. This Prophet will be a future descendant of one of the tribes of Israel.

Moses is preaching about this one particular Prophet, who will come, one day, because back in Genesis 3:15, God promised that he would send a Savior—someone, who would fulfill all of God's Laws and would make satisfaction for God's punishment for all people, since all people have sinned and fallen short of God's glory.

"15 The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your brothers—it is to him you shall listen— 16 just as you desired of the Lord your God at Horeb on the

day of the assembly (see Deut. 9:10), when you said, 'Let me not hear again the voice of the LORD my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die.' (Ex. 20:18-21) ¹⁷ And the LORD said to me, 'They are right in what they have spoken. (Deut. 5:28) ¹⁸ I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their brothers. And I will put my words in his mouth (Jer. 1:9; 5:14), and he shall speak to them all that I command him." (Deuteronomy 18:15-18)

Moses wants the future generations of Israelites to remember the promise that God made back in Genesis to send a Prophet—a Savior—who would redeem all mankind from going to hell. Moses tells the Israelites that they should listen to this Prophet, and that they should have the same awe and respect for this Prophet, because this Prophet will speak only what God tells him to say.

We also hear Moses telling the Israelites—and telling us—how important it is to fear, love and trust in God above all things—as we understand the First Commandment. "¹⁶ just as you desired of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly (see Deut. 9:10), when you said, 'Let me not hear again the voice of the Lord my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die.' (Ex. 20:18-21) ¹⁷ And the Lord said to me, 'They are right in what they have spoken. (Deut. 5:28)

God is as approachable as a close friend or family member, but God cannot be in the presence of sin. So when you and I sin, when we do and say things against God and against someone else, then we are not able to be in close proximity to God. But, "If we confess our sins, [God] is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

When we confess our sins—acknowledge that we have said or done something against God and someone else, then we are fearing, loving and trusting in God above all things. When we confess our sins and receive God's gracious forgiveness, then we work on restoring that broken relationship.

Moses preached about the importance of restoring and maintaining that relationship with God. When we listen to God's Word—when we confess our sins and receive God's forgiveness-then we are able to grow more in the grace and knowledge of what the Prophet will do for us.

God said through Moses: "¹⁸ I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their brothers. And I will put my words in his mouth (Jer. 1:9; 5:14), and he shall speak to them all that I command him." (Deuteronomy 18:18)

Moses keeps stressing the importance of listening to what this Prophet says. Moses says later that when the people ignore God's Word—when they turn away from God's Word—when they reject God's Word—that bad things will happen.

And we see the results today in our own country of people in the past and the decisions that they made. Why else do we have large groups of people in our country, who think that it's perfectly acceptable to kill unborn babies—or to have surgery to try and change from being a man to being a woman—or to eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow we die?

There are so many things that people have done in the past—things that are contrary to God's Word—and yet some folks consider perfectly acceptable. Abortion—divorce—gay marriage—the list goes on and on. It's a sad situation that we live with today.

Many people have turned from God and have become his enemies, and some of those people celebrate that fact. And that is a terrible sad situation to be in. In fact, all of these actions that are contrary to God's Word are the obvious results of sin in our lives.

Paul tells us this in Romans chapter 12: "as it is written: 'None is righteous, no, not one; no one understands; no one seeks for God. All have turned aside; together they have become worthless;

no one does good, not even one." (Romans 3:10-12)

Moses preached about the importance of following God's Word—desiring to follow him and not to follow the pagans of this world. This is why Moses preached about the Prophet, who would come after him, and who he wanted the Israelites to listen to and do what he said.

We know what has happened—this Prophet is Jesus, who was born in a barn—lived his life perfectly—was killed on a cross—and then three days later was raised from the dead for the forgiveness of your sins. This is the Prophet, who Moses preached about.

We know that this Prophet—this Jesus—speaks only what God our Heavenly Father tells him to speak. Jesus listens to God the Father and that is what he speaks. So we know that when Jesus speaks that he is only speaking truth.

God also uses ordinary men, who will prophesy and preach the truth of God's Word. Many of these prophets and priests will speak only the truth from God's Word. Sadly, though, some of these alleged prophets or priests will not be speaking the truth from God's Word. These false prophets are simply preaching and teaching what the people want to hear—not necessarily what God wants them to hear.

We see this happening today, and all throughout history—some men and women, who claim to have a message from God—but they are not speaking the truth from God's Word. "¹⁹ And whoever will not listen to my words (Jer. 29:19; 35:13) that he shall speak in my name, I myself will require it of him. ²⁰ But the prophet who presumes to speak a word in my name that I have not commanded him to speak (Deut. 13:5), or who speaks in the name of other gods, that same prophet shall die." (Deuteronomy 18:19-20)

God does not like people, who speak lies in his name—people, who claim that they are preaching a true prophetic message from God, but in fact they are just making up stuff. God takes distributing his Word seriously. "20 But the prophet who presumes to speak a word in my name that I have not commanded him to speak (Deut. 13:5), or who speaks in the name of other gods, that same prophet shall die."

Throughout history, we can read about any number of men and women, who claimed that they were able to tell about a future event or even predict when the world would end and Jesus would come One Last Time. Of course, none of these prophetic messages came true.

God's Word is rock solid, and yet some people—even some alleged Christians—claim that they understand the truth of God's Word, but deny its power. Some Christians convince themselves that the way that they understand the Bible is the only way—and everyone else is wrong.

I often think, if the same message of the Bible has been taught throughout the centuries that we continue to preach and teach in this church, then how could so many Christians over the centuries be wrong? But Moses tells us how we can know if what a prophet or priest says is really true.

"²¹ And if you say in your heart, 'How may we know the word that the LORD has not spoken?'—²² when a prophet speaks in the name of the LORD, if the word does not come to pass or come true, that is a word that the LORD has not spoken; the prophet has spoken it presumptuously. You need not be afraid of him.'" (Deuteronomy 18:21-22)

When a prophet or priest speaks, and the people question whether this man was actually speaking the truth from God's Word, then they simply wait to see if what he said comes true. If it come true, then the people will know for a fact that what he said came from God. But, if what he said does

not happen, then the people will know that what that alleged prophet said was not from God, and the people can ignore him.

Today you can follow the same pattern. If what I preach and teach is questionable, you can do two things—read in the Bible yourself and see if what I said is actually in the Bible. You can also wait to see if what I said actually happens. Then, you will know the truth and the truth will set you free.

When you read or listen to the Bible regularly, then you are filling up with Jesus regularly. When you fill up with Jesus, then you will know if a pastor on TV or the internet gives some prophetic message, then you do the two things I suggested: 1) dig into the Bible to see if what the TV pastor said is true, and then 2) wait and see if what he said will actually happen. The truth of God's Word will never lie. It will always set you free. Seek the truth from God's Word alone. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.



- 1. A Bible translator was working on a native dialect. His biggest challenge was to find a word in the language for believe. As he was working one day, a young man who had converted to Christianity came into his hut. He had run from a nearby village with a message and was out of breath. Before he could convey the message, he had to sit. As he plopped down into a chair, he said in his language, "Before I give you this message, I need to put all of me into this chair and rest." Suddenly the translator had the word he needed for believe: "put all of me into this and rest." What kinds of things do people today "put themselves into and rest"?
- 2. "My soul finds rest in God alone; my salvation comes from Him" (Psalm 62:1). How does God provide our soul with rest?
- 3. Luther explains that every aspect of life—both physical and spiritual—is God's gift. In what ways does creation bear witness to God's goodness and kindness?
- 4. St. Paul expressed his confidence, "My God will meet all your needs according to His glorious riches in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19). How does the cross reveal the depth of God's love and care for the world? for you personally?
- 5. In all of creation, there is no one exactly like you. For what specific qualities and talents are you most thankful?

PARAMENTS ON OUR ALTAR:

Color is everywhere. Color is God's way of filling his world with beauty and giving pleasure to those who live in this colorful world. Christians, for centuries, have used color in divine worship to emphasize the redemptive action of God through his Son. Color's Purpose However, color and its bright message can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners, traditionally employed each Sunday, must be seen as more than an attempt to decorate, or give accent to the chancel. That is, no doubt, the view of some. It's true; interior design and decoration are important. But a greater service is demanded of our liturgical colors than merely making the surroundings "pretty." Furthermore, when altar paraments are used year after year without much attention given to their message, as well as their care, the pastor, along with his faithful altar guild would do well to throw away the key to the sacristy and refrain from using those altar cloth "decorations." Frequent instruction about the church year and its corresponding colors must go hand in hand with its weekly use

<u>Color, like music</u>, plays an important role in the life of God's worshiping people. Just as music is the "handmaiden to theology," liturgical color complements the message of the seasons and occasions during the church year. Taking a familiar seat in the nave of his/her chapel preceding worship on any given Sunday, the worshiper's emotions and intellect are immediately engaged by color. Liturgical colors aid in establishing a climate in which Law and Gospel may be heard and received. Color allows us to see the Light of Life, Jesus Christ. It serves to communicate the message of salvation. And communicate it does when it reinforces a specific "colorful" chapter in the life of our Lord and his church, retold annually by the church calendar.

<u>Symbolism of Colors</u> It is appropriate, from time to time, to take a thoughtful and fresh look at the colors that are displayed throughout the church year. In the end, we admit, the use of paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners is an adiaphoron. Even the symbolism behind the traditional colors is somewhat arbitrary and open to additional interpretations as generations pass. The primary source and guarantor of their meanings is tradition. However, the important thing to remember is why we retain this traditional liturgical standard. The value of the "Bg-BgsPwr" color scheme rests in their purpose: to serve God's worshiping community by assisting in communicating the holy faith from generation to generation. In every age, the beauty and symbolism of color in the church continues to serve us exceptionally well!

Green, comes next in the acronym and is by far the most common color seen during the year. *Lutheran Ser*vice Book calls for its use during the seasons of Epiphany and Pentecost. The first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21), also known as Easter Sunday, determines the length of these two seasons. The days of Epiphany may entail a total of, but not more than, eight Sundays. The season of Pentecost, on the other hand, can last from 22 to 28 Sundays. Green is the appointed color for all but a few of the Sundays during these seasons. Consequently, green may be used an average of six to eight months of any given liturgical year! Epiphany's message of Christ's revelation to the Gentiles along with the season's traditional emphasis on extending Christ's kingdom through missions, calls for the use of green-the color symbolic of growth. The Sundays following Pentecost, observed as "the time of the church," share a somewhat similar theme as that of Epiphany. Affectionately called the season of the "green meadow," no doubt due to the fact of green being the established color, these Sundays also emphasize the subject of growth. Green is a neutral color, but there is nothing colorless about our need to grow and mature as disciples of Jesus Christ. That's why the "green meadow" time of the church year is so lengthy. Time must be given to encourage all worshipers to maintain their faith through the constant use of God's means of grace. A helpful suggestion for congregations observing summer and fall months with one neutral color, would be to invest time and effort in obtaining several sets of green paraments. Variety and change in shades of this color would go a long way in keeping the season fresh and "green." Changing the paraments every six weeks would complement the Sundays following Pentecost and their emphasis on personal faith that is living and growing.
