St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Isaiah 6:1–13 / Psalm 138 / 1 Corinthians 14:12b–20 / Luke 5:1–11

> Sermon Title: Joining Jesus in His Ministry Sermon Text: Luke 5:1-11

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

We start most every worship service with Confession and Absolution, confessing our sins as recorded in First John chapter 1: "If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

One key point in our text from Luke for today is when Peter realizes that Jesus, the man he had been following and learning from, really is the Messiah promised from God our Heavenly Father. When Peter realizes that Jesus is the Messiah, his attitude changes.

"But when Simon Peter saw [the large catch of fish], he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord.'" It was an appropriate response. Peter recognized that he had his doubts about the things Jesus had talked about, and now Peter sees that Jesus was absolutely right.

Some days I wonder, if Jesus walked into our sanctuary today, what would be your initial, knee -jerk reaction? Would you proudly stick out your chest, head held high, hand outstretched ready to shake Jesus' hand? // Would you cower and try to find the fastest exit out of the church building? // Would you kneel down and bow your head acknowledging that he is the Christ, the Son of the Living God?

Whatever your immediate, knee-jerk reaction would be, you would do something. I'm sure of that. You might immediately recognize that Jesus is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and that this Jesus died on a cross to save you from going to hell. And this realization is what would make you respond the way you would.

So, let's hear what more Jesus said in our Gospel lesson: "And when [Jesus] had finished speaking [to the crowd], he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch.' ⁵ And Simon answered, 'Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets.' ⁶ And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. ⁷ They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink." (Luke 5:4-7)

Here we see Peter and his peers had been fishing all night long, as was their custom. In the morning, they were mending their nets and cleaning up from last night's fishing. This particular

time, Peter says that they fished all night long and got nothing!

And yet, Peter acknowledges that Jesus is the one he is learning from, so Peter does what Jesus asks. *And Simon answered, 'Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets.'*

Peter follows Jesus' instructions—even though they had just spent at least eight hours fishing for nothing—and Peter and his friends were probably really tired. In spite of this situation, Peter and his friends row his boat out into deep waters and lets down his nets. All the while, Peter may have been thinking that this was a pointless endeavor. He did it anyway.

Right away, Peter sees and experiences a miracle. "And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. ⁷ They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink." (Luke 5:4-7)

Have you ever felt God prompting you to do something—talk to a stranger at Walmart—pay for the person behind you at the drive through at McDonald's—or go take a plate of cookies to a neighbor, who you rarely see?

You might not want to do any of those things, but you know that God the Holy Spirit was prompting you to step out of your comfort zone a little bit and do something for someone else. Even though you might not have wanted to do whatever God was prompting you to do, you did it anyway. This is exactly what happened to Peter.

He and his friends had been fishing all night long to an avail. Now, it is morning, and Jesus wanted Peter to row his boat out into sea. We hear in what he says a tone of—this is a bad idea. "And Simon answered, 'Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets."

Almost reluctantly, Peter does what Jesus asks him—to row his boat out into the deep waters and throw out his nets. Then, Peter sees a miracle: his fishing nets were filled so full with fish that dragging the nets into the boat nearly caused Peter's boat to sink. That's a lot of fish!

⁸ But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord.' ⁹ For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish that they had taken, ¹⁰ and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men.' ¹¹ And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him." (Luke 5:8-11)

This is when Peter realizes who Jesus is. Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of the Living God. And this is when Peter's immediate, knee-jerk reaction is to tell Jesus to go away from him, because Peter recognizes standing in front of Jesus that he is a poor, sinful being in desperate need of forgiveness which only comes from God.

Earlier, I asked you what would be your immediate, knee-jerk reaction if Jesus suddenly walked into our sanctuary? What would you do? Would you do nothing, acting as though Jesus were just another man, who wasn't from this area? This is how many of the Jews reacted when Jesus

started his public ministry.

But Peter knew. He knew immediately that this Jesus was the Messiah, who had been prophesied throughout the entire Old Testament. Peter knew who Jesus was, and this is why he reacted the way he did: "But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord."

Peter recognized that he was a poor, sinful being on his own merits standing there in front of Jesus. And yet, Peter also knew that this Jesus was the only God-man, who could—who would forgive Peter's sins and the sins of every single person on this planet.

This is what we read in First John chapter one: "If we confess our sins, [God] is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9) And we read in Psalm 32: "I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the LORD,' and you forgave the iniquity of my sin." (Psalm 32:5)

When you confess your sins, God forgives you. Peter recognized that he was a poor, sinful being standing there in front of Jesus, which is why he did what he did: "...he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord.'"

Peter saw Jesus for who Jesus really is—the God-man, Jesus Christ, who we confess in the words of the Athanasian Creed: "Perfect God and perfect man, composed of a rational soul and human flesh; equal to the Father with respect to His divinity, less than the Father with respect to His humanity.... For as the rational soul and flesh is one man, // so God and man is one Christ, // Who suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, // rose again the third day from the dead, // Ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, God Almighty, // from whence He will come to judge the living and the dead." (Athanasian Creed: #30-31, 35-37)

But then right after Peter recognizes that he is a poor, sinful being standing before Jesus, Jesus calms him and his friends in the boat. "And Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men.' ¹¹ And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him." (Luke 5:10-11)

Jesus never wants to scare people. Jesus is love incarnate, and his desire is that all people come to him and spend eternity with him in heaven. That's Jesus' ultimate desire. This is why Jesus willingly died on a cross over two thousand years ago so that you and I and all people in this country and every country on this planet did not have to go to hell when we die for all the bad things we have said or done against God and against someone else.

Jesus comforts Peter and his friends in the boat, and then invites them to join him in his ministry of sharing the Good News to more people not just in Israel and the Middle East, but around the world. We know that the twelve disciples of Jesus did just that. They went out to all the known world at the time and told more people about Jesus and what he has done for them.

Right there in that boat, Jesus invites Peter and his two friends to join him in his ministry. "And Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men.' ¹¹ And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him." (Luke 5:10-11)

And that's what they did! Peter and his friends laboriously rowed the boat to shore hauling in

a huge number of fish. Then Scripture tells us another amazing thing—they walked away from the only work they had probably ever known.

That would seem like a very surprising thing to do. You lad the biggest deal of your work life, and then are compelled to walk away from your job of twenty years. But this is exactly what Peter and his friends did.

This all started one morning after Peter and his friends had been fishing all night long, and caught nothing. Peter sounds like he's reluctant to do what Jesus asks, but Peter and his friends row the boat out into deep waters, and they throw out their nets. Soon, their fishing nets are bulging with a huge catch of fish, so many fish that the boat was nearly sinking.

Peter and his friends slowly row their boat to shore, and then realizing what is now truly the

most important thing in their lives, they walk away from the amazing catch of fish and the work that they had probably been doing for many years.

Now, Jesus has called Peter and his friends—James and John, sons of Zebedee—to follow him and to learn from him. Peter, James and John now know what their real purpose in life is from that time forward. Their purpose was to share the Good News about Jesus to more people—Jews and non-Jews.

So where do you fit into this story? Are you a disciple of Jesus Christ? That is, do you follow Jesus as the one who will lead and guide you every day of your life? Do you desire to know more about Jesus? If so, read or listen to your Bible every day.

But also study the Bible. Come sit in on the adult Bible class on Sundays after worship. You can also talk with me about a particular Bible passage. When you read or listen to the Bible, you grow in the grace and knowledge of what God the Father has done for you through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Following Jesus isn't easy. It seems a big part of our society today wants to get rid of God. Some people today want to silence Christians, who confess that Jesus is Lord. Of course, this thinking isn't new. Throughout the centuries past, there have been years when Christians were persecuted for believing in Jesus. There were periods in which Christians were harassed for believing in their Lord and Savior Jesus.

But through it all, Jesus promises one thing over and over—that he is with you ALWAYS until the end of the age—until the day when he returns one Last Day to take us to be with him in heaven for all eternity. That is the rock-solid truth that keeps me going. I pray that promise is the rock-solid truth to keep you going.

The peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

CHRISTIAN QUESTIONS

15. What should we do when we eat His body and drink His blood, and in this way receive His pledge? We should remember and proclaim His death and the shedding of His blood, as He taught us: This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me.


