> Sermon Title: Love Your Enemy with the Help of God Sermon Text: Luke 6:27-38

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Our text for today is part of the Sermon on the Mount which Jesus preached to a crowd of people, who wanted to hear what he had to say. This part of the Sermon on the Mount Jesus talks about loving your enemies and judging others. They go hand in hand.

The say to you who hear, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. 29 To one who strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also, and from one who takes away your cloak do not withhold your tunic² either. 30 Give to everyone who begs from you, and from one who takes away your goods do not demand them back. 31 And as you wish that others would do to you, do so to them." (Luke 6:27-31)

The core of Jesus' teaching is "love." Now, in this part of his sermon, Jesus tells his disciples and the rest of the crowd that they are to ramp up their ability to love, and to love their enemies and those, who they want to judge.

This was a radical thing to preach and teach about. In the old Jewish thinking, Jews stayed away from non-Jews. Jews only hung out with other Jews. Jews did NOT show any kind of love to non-Jews. Jews only showed love to their fellow Jews.

So now Jesus, a Jew himself, is teaching that Jews and non-Jews alike need to love one another and to especially love those, who are their enemies. WHAT?!?! This could be a hard thing for us to do, but thanks be to God, with God ALL things are possible—including loving your enemies.

After all, this is the Second Greatest Commandment: love your neighbor as yourself. You can only love your neighbor as yourself when you love God and desire to know him more. You are only able to know God more when you fill up with Jesus by reading or listening to God's Word. You are only able to fill up with Jesus by studying God's Word in the adult Bible class—by praying about a particular passage that you read or listened to—by hungering and thirsting for the truth from God's Word.

"27 But I say to you who hear, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. 29 To one who strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also, and from one who takes away your cloak do not withhold your tunic either. 30 Give to everyone who begs from you, and from one who takes away your goods do not demand them back. 31 And as you wish that others would do to you, do so to them." (Luke 6:27-31)Why would God want you to love your enemies? Because God created us to be in fellowship and communion with him and with everyone around us. How does God want you to love your enemies? "27 But I say to you who hear I ove your enemies do good to those who hate you 28 bless those who

"27 But I say to you who hear, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. 29 To one who strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also, and from one who takes away your cloak do not withhold your tunic either." Pray for you enemies. Pray and ask God to help you to pray for your enemies. Pray and ask God to bless your enemies with God's grace and mercy. Of course, if you really hate your enemies, then you need to pray and ask God to forgive you for hating your enemy. Confess your sins and receive God's gracious forgiveness.

Just because someone has done or said something to you, doesn't give you the right—or

make it right—when you carry around your anger and hatred towards that person. On the contrary, Jesus tells us: "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all." (Romans 12:18)

Living peaceably with all is possible only by the work of the Holy Spirit in you. When the Holy Spirit lives in you, He teaches you how to love God and to love your neighbor as yourself. The Holy Spirit also reminds you of God's Word—showing you where you might have sinned against God and against someone else. The Holy Spirit also will remind you of the comforting, wonderful forgiveness of sins that God freely gives to those, who confess their sins.

Then, Luke tells us: "And as you wish that others would do to you, do so to them." (Luke 6:27-31) You've heard this before in your life. Treat others the way you want to be treated. If you want other people to treat you badly, then you treat other people badly. If you want other people to treat you kindly, then you treat other people kindly.

When you treat other people kindly—when you love other people—including your enemies—the way God treats you, then you are able to live according to the Second Greatest Commandment: love your neighbor as yourself.

³² If you love those who love you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. ³³ And if you do good to those who do good to you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. ³⁴ And if you lend to those from whom you expect to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to get back the same amount. ³⁵ But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return, and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil. ³⁶ Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful." (Luke 6:32-36)

Jesus continues this part of the Sermon on the Mount talking about loving your enemies, and he points out how people often act. As I said earlier, in the past, Jews only socialized with other Jews. Jews did not show love to non-Jews. In fact, over time, the Second Greatest Commandment: love your neighbor as yourself—got distorted and changed into this: "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." (Matthew 5:43-44)

Love your neighbor and hate your enemy. That was the common thinking among Jews even when Jesus walked on this planet. But Jesus points out the problem with this statement. ³² If you love those who love you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. ³³ And if you do good to those who do good to you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. ³⁴ And if you lend to those from whom you expect to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to get back the same amount." (Luke 6.32-34)

This is human nature at its core. Jews only wanted to socialize with other Jews. Americans only want to socialize with other Americans. Chinese people prefer to socialize with other Chinese people. Jesus is just pointing out how we humans operate. If you only love those people, who love you back, then who cares? Why do you lend only to those people, who you know will pay you back? This is why Jesus tells you how to love your enemies: "But love your enemies, and do good, Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil. Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful." (Luke 6:35-36) and lend, expecting nothing in return, and your reward will be great, and you The first radical key phrase that Jesus taught was "love you enemy." The will be sons of the second radical key phrase in Jesus' sermon: "expect nothing in return." Sometimes we give expecting something in return. Jesus tells us to pray for enemies, and to expect nothing in return. This can also ben a hard teaching. "But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just." (Luke 14:13-14) When you give, do not expect anything in return. This is why it is very possible—with the help of God the Holy Spirit in you—to love your enemies. Pray and ask God to help you to pray for your enemies. It's really hard to keep being angry at someone when

you are praying for them.

When you pray for your enemy, then you are doing exactly what Jesus is teaching: loving your neighbor as yourself.

Paul points out the importance of praying for your enemy: "To the contrary, 'if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head.' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12.20-21)

"Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Overcome evil with good. You might not want to overcome evil with good. You might want to pray for terrible things to happen to your enemy, but Jesus tells us that love is the fulfillment of the commandments, and that by the work of the Holy Spirit living in you are you able to pray for your enemy and overcome evil with good.

When you live out the Second Greatest Commandment, and love your neighbor as yourself, then you will be able to "...live peaceably with all." When you are living peaceably with all, with the help of the Holy Spirit in you, then you will know better how to relate to others. You will know how to love your neighbor as yourself, even if your neighbor has become your enemy.

When you are able to love your neighbor as yourself, then you will understand more how much God loves you and how much God cares for you and how much God desires that you live according to His Holy Word. When you understand God's Holy Word more, then you will understand the importance of NOT judging others.

³⁷ Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven; ³⁸ give, and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you." (Luke 6:27–38)

"For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you." However you treat others, that is how they will treat you. When you hold a ruler in your hand, and you quickly smack people in the head when they do or say something against God and against someone else, then you are judging others.

When you judge others, then you are acting as though you are God. But Jesus points out: "For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you." Whatever standards you hold other people to, God will hold you to the same standards. However you treat other people, that is how those people will treat you.

If you want other people to spit on you and treat you badly, then go ahead and treat them badly. If you want other people to treat you kindly, then show those people kindness and mercy and grace from God Almighty. It is the Holy Spirit, who helps you relate to other people the way God wants you to relate to them—by loving your neighbor as yourself.

The peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.


