"Back to the Basics"

A Review of our Christian Faith

2nd Sunday after Pentecost

6 June 2021

St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA

Genesis 3:8–15 / Ps. 130 / 2 Corinthians 4:13—5:1 / Mark 3:20–35

Sermon Title: The First Great Commandment

Sermon Text: Deuteronomy 6:1-9

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Today is the first day of our summer sermon series called "Back to the Basics." The subtitle for our summer sermon series is "A Review of our Christian Faith." We're going to work are way through *Luther's Small Catechism* as an outline for our weekly sermons and our weekly adult Bible studies.

Luther's Small Catechism was a resource—a tool—that Martin Luther wrote for parents to teach their children the chief parts of the Christian faith. The Small Catechism is rich resource of information, and everything in the Small Catechism comes straight out of the Bible.

Even though the Small Catechism was originally meant as a textbook to teach children the chief parts of the Christian faith, adults can also use this resource as a refresher of the stuff that you learned when you went through Confirmation. Even Luther said that he needed to study the core truths of the Bible regularly.

Today and next Sunday we're going to talk about the Ten Commandments. The Ten Commandments can be divided into two parts—the First Table of the Law and the Second Table of the Law. The First Table of the Law focuses on the first three commandments. These first three commandments have to do with our relationship with God. The Second Table of the Law focuses on the last seven commandments. These last seven commandments have to do with our relationship with our neighbors.

So today we're going to focus on the First Table of the Law which includes the first three commandments. The First Table of the Law—the first three commandments—can be summarized as: Love God.

Now, in theory that should be easy, but it often isn't. Why is it so hard to love God? Sure, you might love God when things are going great in your life. But do you love God when things are going badly? When you physically or emotionally hurt? Let's look at this chunk of Deuteronomy chapter 6 verses one to three:

"Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the rules—that the LORD your God commanded me to teach you, that you may do them in the land to which you are going over, to possess it, ² that you may fear the LORD your God, you and your son and your son's son, by keeping all his statutes and his commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that your days may be long. ³ Hear therefore, O Israel, and be careful to do them, that it may go well with you, and that you may multiply greatly, as the LORD, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a

land flowing with milk and honey." (Deuteronomy 6:1-3)

The entire Book of Deuteronomy is really a review of the previous four books—Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus and Numbers. For example, the Ten Commandments are recorded in Exodus chapter 20 and Deuteronomy chapter 5. Here in Deuteronomy chapter six, Moses reminds the people—and us today—the importance of knowing God's Law—what he expects of us and how we are to live.

"Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the rules—that the LORD your God commanded me to teach you, that you may do them in the land to which you are going over, to possess it, ² that you may fear the LORD your God, you and your son and your son's son, by keeping all his statutes and his commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that your days may be long. ³ Hear therefore, O Israel, and be careful to do them, that it may go well with you, and that you may multiply greatly, as the LORD, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a land flowing with milk and honey." (Deuteronomy 6:1-3)

All throughout the Scriptures—but these first five books of the Old Testament in particular—we read about the benefits to obeying God's Laws. "Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the rules—that the LORD your God commanded me to teach you, that you may do them in the land to which you are going over, to possess it,"

In Deuteronomy chapter 6 verse two begins the benefits of following God's Laws—especially the Ten Commandments. ² that you may FEAR the LORD your God, you and your son and your son's son, by keeping all his statutes and his commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that YOUR DAYS may be long.

The first benefit is FEARING God. FEARING God in this sense means that we stand in awe of God—we see that God deserves so much respect that we WANT to come before him and we WANT to give God all praise thank—service and obeying we can.

The second benefit: ³ Hear therefore, O Israel, and be careful to do them, that it may GO WELL WITH YOU, and that you may MULTIPLY GREATLY, as the LORD, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a land flowing with milk and honey."

The second benefit of obeying God's Laws is that God will bless you—but he may bless you in a way that you don't see as a blessing. God also gives you the opportunity to grow in your faith—and to grow as a family.

Unfortunately, today too many people want God to bless them, but they don't want to follow his commandments and teachings. We know this by the way that some people live their lives. When you live however you want not thinking about God at all, then things won't go so well for you. But when you live the way God desires for you to live, then God blesses you in many ways.

When you fear, love and trust in God above ALL THINGS, then you are putting your relationship with God in a right perspective. You only get to heaven by your faith in Jesus. God also gives you opportunities to serve him through the good works that he has prepared for you to do.

Some of these good works include living as a husband and wife, who seek guidance and direction from God to work on their marriage. Some of these good works include living as a father and mother, who seek guidance and direction from God as to how to raise God-fearing children. These next six verses in our text from Deuteronomy

chapter 6 are ways that you can live a God-pleasing life according to God's Laws—the Ten Commandments.

⁴ "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. ⁵ You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. ⁶ And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. ⁷ You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. ⁸ You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. ⁹ You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9)

It is in this section that we find the summary of the First Table of the Law—love God. The First Table of the Law—which includes the first three commandments—is summarized with these two words: love God. When you fear, love and trust in God above ALL THINGS then you are living out what is talked about in the first three commandments. The first three commandments focus on our relationship with God.

Verses four through nine are also considered a creed—a statement of faith—which Jewish people today use in their own worship services. ⁴ "Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. ⁵ You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. ⁶ And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. ⁷ You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. ⁸ You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. ⁹ You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on gates your." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9)

And what does God require of you: 1) love God above all things. 2) teach these Ten Commandments and the rest of the truths of God's Word to your children. You can use Luther's Small Catechism as a tool to start teaching your children the chief parts of the Christian faith. And 3) keep his teachings before you all the time.

God wants you to teach your children these truths all the time. ⁷ You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise."

In other words, God is encouraging you to teach these truths to your children and the rest of your family on a regular basis—when you're at home—when you're out in the market—when you are work. In addition to teaching these truths to your children and family, God encouraged the Israelites: "8 You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. 9 You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on gates your."

God knows that if you see these truths written down or you have some physical reminder of the truths from the Bible, then you will remember them and make them a regular part of your life. In other words, if you regularly read or listen to the Bible, then you are filling up with Jesus.

And when you fill up with Jesus, then you will know the truths of the Bible and you will know how to live—what God expects of you as a husband, wife, father, mother, employer, employee and so on. When you know the truths of God's Word, then you will know how to live according to the First Table of the Law—according to the firs

three commandments.

Most everyone has a mobile phone, and right there in your pocket or purse you can use your phone to remind you of the truths of God's Word. Download a Bible app and then set that app to remind you every day to read a portion of Scripture. It's really that easy.

Of course, if you like books, then keep your Bible out on the kitchen table where you'll see it every morning and remind you to read another portion of Scripture. Filling up with Jesus isn't as difficult as we make it.

Again, the first three commandments are summarized with these two words: love God. If you struggle at loving God, then pray and ask God to help you to love him. Pray and ask God to create a love for him and his Word in you so that you will grow in your faith.

When you know the truth from God's Word, then you will have a foundation on which you live your life. When other people tell you that you don't need God—or that heaven doesn't exist—or that Jesus is a fake—then you will be equipped with the truth.

When you know the truth from God's Word, then you have a foundation to work from. One sacrament to help build on this foundation is your baptism. It's important to remember your baptism, what God the Holy Spirit has done in your life, how he created faith in you and how God the Holy Spirit continues to nurture your faith.

Paul talks about this in Ephesians 4: "I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ² with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³ eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴ There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call—⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. ⁷ But grace was given to each one of us according to the measure of Christ's gift." (Ephesians 4.1-7)

Now, remembering your baptism isn't a happy mantra that you chant every morning while drinking your cup of coffee. Remembering your baptism is one way to remind yourself of how God has worked in your life—how God brought you out of spiritual darkness into God's glorious, life-giving light.

When you remember your baptism, then you are reminding yourself that there is only one God and Father of all, and that God the Father sent his one- and only-begotten Son, Jesus to die for your sins and mine and to give you new life by his resurrection from the dead.

This passage from Ephesians can help us focus on the summary of the First Table of the Law—Love God. This passage reminds us "⁴ There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call— ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all."

Last Sunday was Holy Trinity Sunday, and it was the day in which we confessed our faith using the words of the Athanasian Creed. When we confess that we believe in ONE God—that is the one and only God, who we follow. When we confess that there is only ONE faith—in the ONE true God—then we are able to live according to the summary of the First Table of the Law—Love God.

This passage from Ephesians is also like a creed in that we state the core biblical truths of what we believe. "⁴ There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call— ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all."

And in this day and age, it's really important to know what the truth is. There are so many people in this world, who adamantly believe all sorts of things that are contrary to the Bible. Our job as believers—as disciples of Jesus Christ—is to know the truth—by reading or listening to the Bible and studying it regularly—and to then share the truth when an opportunity arises.

This is what Paul writes in Ephesians chapter 4 verses 15-16: "Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love." (Ephesians 4:15-16)

The First Table of the Law is summarized with these two words: Love God. This is how Paul wants us to live each day—fearing, love and trusting in God Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth. You're able to fear, love and trust in God your Heavenly Father by the work of the Holy Spirit in you, who encourages you with promise from the Bible such as Jesus saying: I will never leave you nor forsake you. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

"The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1).



Green, comes next in the acronym and is by far the most common color seen during the year. *Lutheran Service Book* calls for its use during the seasons of Epiphany and <u>Pentecost</u>. The first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21), also known as Easter Sunday, determines the length of these two seasons.

The days of Epiphany may entail a total of, but not more than, eight Sundays. The season of Pentecost, on the other hand, can last from 22 to 28 Sundays. Green is the appointed color for all but a few of the Sundays during these seasons. Consequently, green may be used an average of six to eight months of any given liturgical year!

Epiphany's message of Christ's revelation to the Gentiles along with the season's traditional emphasis on extending Christ's kingdom through missions, calls for the use of green-the color symbolic of growth.

The Sundays following Pentecost, observed as "the time of the church," share a somewhat similar theme as that of Epiphany. Affectionately called the season of the "green meadow," no doubt due to the fact of green being the established color, these Sundays also emphasize the subject of growth.

Green is a neutral color, but there is nothing colorless about our need to grow and mature as disciples of Jesus Christ. That's why the "green meadow" time of the church year is so lengthy.

Time must be given to encourage all worshipers to maintain their faith through the constant use of God's means of grace.

A helpful suggestion for congregations observing summer and fall months with one neutral color, would be to invest time and effort in obtaining several sets of green paraments. Variety and change in shades of this color would go a long way in keeping the season fresh and "green." Changing the paraments every six weeks would complement the Sundays following Pentecost and their emphasis on personal faith that is living and growing.

Back to the Basics A Review of our Christian Faith June—August 2021

Today starts our summer sermon series and Bible study. We're using Luther's Small Cate*chism* as the outline for what we'll talk about each week.

It's good to remember that Luther's Small Catechism is a tool—a resource—for parents to use to teach their children the core teachings from the Bible. Of course, adults can also review the material to remind them of what they learned when they went through Confirmation.

During this summer sermon series, I have three goals for this summer sermon series:

That we talk to heart the subtitle of each section in Luther's Small Catechism: "As the head of the family should teach...in a simple way to his household."

Become comfortable with your Bible by keeping the following truth in mind. 2. Scripture interprets Scripture. Context is essential for understanding language. Faithful interpretation of Scripture depends on giving the Bible a full hearing. When reading it, I need to ask: What is the context here? How do other passages of the Bible clarify my understanding of this passage? The Scripture immediately surrounding a passage is a key starting point for interpretation. What situation is being addressed or described? What event or discussion has just taken place? What follows after? Other Scripture written by the same author also helps in interpretation. Each human author used his own style of writing and unique emphases. To better understand a passage in St. Paul's Letter to the Romans, it is helpful to look elsewhere in Romans and then to Paul's other letters. Related Scriptures elsewhere in the Bible are also; helpful, since the entire Bible is inspired by the same Holy Spirit. The truth of God in one book of the Bible clarifies and deepens the divine truth in another. When we find a particular verse or passages elsewhere in the Bible that are more clear. As Luther points out, "Scripture is its own light" (Luthers Werke, vol. 11 (St. Louis: Concordia Publishing House, 1882), 2335).

Have a take-home truth to apply to your daily life. Some examples can be found in the "Table of Duties" at the end of *Luther's Small Catechism*.

Please join the adult Bible class right after worship. Pastor will be leading the discussions on each week's topic. And, of course, there's a Bible reading challenge.

I want to encourage you to read through the entire New Testament during these three months of our sermon series. If you read three chapters each day, then you'll be able to read through the entire New Testament this summer. Make sure you get a Bible reading plan and get started!
