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"Back to the Basics" A Review of our Christian Faith

3rd Sunday after Pentecost 13 June 2021

St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Ezekiel 17:22–24 / Psalm 1 / 2 Corinthians 5:1–10 (11–17) / Mark 4:26–34

Sermon Title: The Second Great Commandment Sermon Text: Leviticus 19:17-18; Luke 10:25-37

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Today is our second week of our summer sermon series and Bible study in which we get "Back to the Basics" and have "A Review of our Christian Faith." Each week we're going to look at a different core truth from the Bible by using *Luther's Small Catechism* as our outline.

Last week we talked about the First Table of the Law, which includes the first three commandments. The First Table of the Law can be summarized with these two words: Love God. The Second Table of the Law, which includes the last seven commandments, can be summarized this way: Love your neighbor as yourself.

Today we're going to focus on the Second Table of the Law and talk about what it means to Love your neighbor as yourself. We get the summary of the Second Table of the Law from the Book of Leviticus. There is quite a bit in Leviticus that talks about how to live according to the Second Table of the Law: Love your neighbor as yourself. Here are some ways to love your neighbor as yourself found in Leviticus chapter 19:

"11 You shall not steal; you shall not deal falsely; you shall not lie to one another. 12 You shall not swear by my name falsely, and so profane the name of your God: I am the LORD. 13 You shall not oppress your neighbor or rob him.... 14 You shall not curse the deaf or put a stumbling block before the blind, but you shall fear your God: I am the LORD.... 17 You shall not hate your brother in your heart, but you shall reason frankly with your neighbor, lest you incur sin because of him. 18 You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against the sons of your own people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD." (Leviticus 19:11-14, 17-18)

Leviticus is pretty straight forward as to how you are to relate to your neighbor—a coworker—a friend —a family member, and I'm pretty sure a lot of people don't remember this stuff—even non-Christians —because nobody is ever interested in a Bible study in the Book of Leviticus. And, yet, Leviticus has a lot of great stuff for us to learn.

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

The two key verses where we get the summary of the Second Table of the Law are Leviticus

19 verses 17-18: "You shall not hate your brother in your heart, but you shall reason frankly with your neighbor, lest you incur sin because of him. You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against the sons of your own people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD."

Jesus repeats this verse several times throughout the Gospels—stressing the importance of how we relate to other people. We live in a day and age in which it seems too many people are only interested in taking care of themselves—and neglecting their neighbor. We see this in a story that Jesus told that is recorded in Luke chapter 10:

"25 And behold, a lawyer stood up to put [Jesus] to the test, saying, 'Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?' ²⁶ He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? How do you read it?' ²⁷ And he answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself.' ²⁸ And he said to him, 'You have answered correctly; do this, and you will live.' ²⁹ But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:25-29)

This text starts out sounding like the lawyer, who came to test Jesus, is heading in the right direction, until verse 29: ²⁹ But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?' How many times do you do this? You want to be right. You want others to think highly of you. You might even approach God as though he OWES you something.

Instead of Jesus dismissing this lawyer, who desired to justify himself, Jesus saw this as another opportunity to teach him the truth from the Bible—which he would have known very well since he was a lawyer, who knew perfectly all the Old Testament laws.

³⁰ Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him and departed, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side." (Luke 10:30-32)

It's easy to rag on this priest and the Levite, who passed by a man, who was obviously in need. And what about you? Have you ever passed by when someone looked a little too unsavory—a little too unkempt—a little too something that made you feel uncomfortable? Sadly, I have. What about you?

It's easy to point fingers at others and try to highlight their sins, but it's really hard to admit your own sins and confess them to our loving and merciful God. And yet, this is exactly the point of the Second Table of the Law, which is summarized: Love your neighbor as yourself.

Jesus continues his teach opportunity: "³³ But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where he was, and when he saw him, he had compassion. ³⁴ He went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he set him on his own animal and brought him to an inn and took care of him. ³⁵ And the next day he took out two denarii³ and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take care of

him, and whatever more you spend, I will repay you when I come back." (Luke 10:33-35)

Jesus first sets the stage that a Jewish man was traveling on a familiar road. Sadly, the man "...fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him and departed, leaving him half dead." Then, a priest and a Levite both walk right pass this man. Scripture indicates that the priest and Levite were also Jewish men by their job title. Then, a Samaritan comes on the scene. Samaritans were a group of people, who were considered "half Jews," because their Jewish parents and grandparents intermarried

with non-Jewish people. This is why full-blooded Jews looked down on Samaritans.

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

At this point in Jesus' story, it would have been surprising and startling for the lawyer and everyone around him to hear this, but Jesus is making a point about WHO does WHAT. Here is the rest of Jesus conversation: ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers? ³⁷ He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' And Jesus said to him, 'You go, and do likewise.'" (Luke 10:33-37)

Here we see an example of racial hatred between two ethnicities, and yet the one who is despised helps the one who despises. The man, who was being helped was a Jew, but that didn't stop the Samaritan from showing mercy to this man. Instead, the Samaritan did his best to help the man, and then took him to a nearby inn and paid for the man's healthcare.

Then, Jesus ends his story with a question: "Which of these three, do you think, proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' And Jesus said to him, 'You go, and do likewise.'"

Jesus was teaching the importance of showing mercy to another human being. Just because someone is different from you—different in a way that makes you feel uncomfortable—does not mean that you should just ignore the person, and hope he or she goes away.

Instead, Jesus wants you to show mercy to everyone, who you meet. When you show mercy to everyone, who you meet, then you are living according to the summary of the Second Table of the Law—Love your neighbor as yourself.

But why is it so hard to love your neighbor as yourself? Sometimes a person has hurt you verbally or physically. That can be a reason it is hard to love your neighbor. Sometimes a person has cheated your or stolen from you. That can be another reason it's hard to love your neighbor.

And yet, God tells us that if you don't confess your sins, God will not forgive you. So, if you don't confess any sin against that person, who you don't like or have trouble relating to, then God will not forgive you either.

This is when we have the best opportunity to come to God—to acknowledge that you have trouble relating to someone else—and then to ask God to help you to forgive that person. You might₄

have to pray many times to God and ask him to help you to forgive that person. And eventually, God will help you forgive that person.

Thankfully *Luther's Small Catechism* has a summary of why it's important to forgive someone—why it's important to confess your sins and to receive God's gracious, life-giving forgiveness. The section in the *Small Catechism* titled "Confession and Office of the Keys" is a great place to start.

In the "Confession and Office of the Keys" section, there is one verse that we use regularly as we begin our worship services: "If we confess our sins, [God] is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9) When we confess our sins and receive God's forgiveness, then we are living out the summary of the Second Table of the Law—Love your neighbor as yourself.

That's it. When you acknowledge that you have said or did something against God and against someone else, then you will receive God's forgiveness. You don't have to do anything else. Simply receive from God his forgiveness.

And yet, this is another sticking point for some people. Some people think that you have to do something in order to appease God—do something in order to make God think favorably on you. If you are a baptized child of God, then God already thinks favorably on you. God created ALL people and all people are precious in his sight.

God gives everyone the opportunity to come to him—to confess their sins and receive forgiveness. Then God the Holy Spirit works in your heart to encourage you with the promises from the Bible. God then encourages you to live the way he has described in the Bible. It's pretty simple. *** NEXT SLIDE ***

Last week we talked about the First Table of the Law, how we are to relate to God. The summary of the First Table of the Law—the summary of the first three commandments—is: Love God. Today we're talking about the Second Table of the Law, how we are to relate to one another. The Second Table of the Law talks about the last seven commandments, and can be summarized: love your neighbor as yourself.

And this is one reason that Jesus talks about the summaries of the First and Second Tables of the Law. The First Table of the Law is also called the First and Greatest Commandment. The Second Table of the Law is also called the Second Greatest Commandment.

Here we see Jesus talking about the First and Second Greatest Commandments in Matthew' Gospel chapter 22. "³⁴ But when the Pharisees heard that [Jesus] had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together. ³⁵ And one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. ³⁶ 'Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?' ³⁷ And [Jesus] said to him, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. ³⁸ This is the great and first

commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. ⁴⁰ On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.'" (Matthew 22:34-40)

The First and Greatest Commandment—is also the summary of the First Table of the Law: Love God. The Second Greatest Commandment—is also the summary of the Second Table of the Law: Love your neighbor as yourself. These two Tables of the Law are simple yet powerful ways that God desires you to live according to His Holy Word.

And even though it can be hard at times to live according to the First Table of the Law and the Second Table of the Law, with God's help it is very possible. Pray and ask God to help you to live the way he tells us in the Bible. Pray and ask Jesus to give you daily strength and encouragement to live according to the First Table of the law and the Second Table of the Law. God hears your prayer. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Back to the Basics A Review of our Christian Faith June—August 2021

Our summer sermon series and Bible study are underway. It's good to get "Back to the Basics" and have "A Review of our Christian Faith" by using *Luther's Small Catechism* to lead us with the different core teachings from the Bible.

I pray that during this sermon series and Bible study, we'll all remember that the Small Catechism is simply a tool—a resource to walk with us through the Scriptures so that we stay on the core teachings of the Christian faith. I have three goals for this summer sermon series:

That we remember what Martin Luther encourages all of us in his *Small Catechism*: "As the head of the family should teach...in a simple way to his household."

Become comfortable with your Bible by keeping the following truth in mind. 3. Testament interprets Testament. The Old Testament tells of God's good creation and our first parents' tragic fall into sin and death. It reveals God's care for His creation, His lordship over history, His wrath and devastating acts of punishment provoked by human sin. Above all, it reveals God's mercy, patience, and faithfulness to generations of His chosen people Israel and His promise to send through them, a Savior for all peoples. The entire Old Testament precedes the birth of Christ, some of it by more than a thousand years. Yet Jesus says that they "bear witness about Me" (John 5:39). We look at the pictures of God's saving plans that the Old Testament provides (for example, animals sacrificed for sin; the temple as God-with-us; David defeating Goliath, the enemy of God's people), and we cannot help but see Jesus. Just as the Old Testament should be read in light of the New, so also many New Testament passages are best understood against the backdrop of the Old. For example, what does the angel mean when he says that God will give Mary's Son "the throne of His father David" (Luke 1:32)? In the Old Testament, God promises King David a descendant (Jesus!) who will graciously rule God's people forever and bring righteousness and justice to the world.

A short take-home truth to apply to your daily life can be found in the "Table of Duties" at the end of *Luther's Small Catechism*.

I'd like to encourage you to join the adult Bible class. We have a lot of great discussions. You don't need to know everything about the Bible before coming, and all kinds of questions are welcome.

And, I want to encourage you to read through the entire New Testament during these three months of our sermon series. If you read three chapters each day, then you'll be able to read through the entire New Testament this summer. Make sure you get a Bible reading plan and get started!






