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"Back to the Basics" A Review of our Christian Faith

7th Sunday after Pentecost 11 July 2021

> Sermon Title: The Lord's Prayer—Part 2 Sermon Text: Proverbs 4:20-27; Proverbs 1:8-19

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

I'm enjoying this summer sermon series and Bible study as we work our way through the chief parts of the Christian faith outlined in Luther's Small Catechism. I pray that you are also enjoying it, and finding it a refreshing opportunity to be reminded all that you learned in Confirmation class years ago.

Last Sunday we talked about the first half of the Lord's Prayer. Last Sunday we talked about the Lord's Prayer Introduction and the first four petitions. The Lord's Prayer Introduction and first four petitions focus on our relationship with God.

Today we're going to look at the last half of the Lord's Prayer—last three petitions and the conclusion. The last half of the Lord's Prayer focuses on our relationship with other people. So, we could also say that the last half of the Lord's Prayer can be summarized as: love your neighbor as yourself.

To dig more into the last three petitions and conclusion of the Lord's Prayer, we're going to look at two sections from the Book of Proverbs—Proverbs 4 and Proverbs 1. First, let's look at Proverbs 4 verses 20-27:

⁽²⁰ My son, be attentive to my words; incline your ear to my sayings. ²¹ Let them not escape from your sight; keep them within your heart. ²² For they are life to those who find them, and healing to all their flesh. ²³ Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life. ²⁴ Put away from you crooked speech, and put devious talk far from you. ²⁵ Let your eyes look directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you. ²⁶ Ponder the path of your feet; then all your ways will be sure. ²⁷ Do not swerve to the right or to the left; turn your foot away from evil." (Proverbs 4:20-27)

The Book of Proverbs has a ton of great stuff to help you grow in your faith—to remind you daily of the elementary truths of the Christian faith which are summarized in Luther's Small Catechism. One reason that the instructions in the Book of Proverbs are personal is that they are written by a father to his son. As I read through Proverbs, I hear my own dad talking to me—teaching me important truths to live by so that I can live according to the First and Second Greatest Commandments—Love God and Love your neighbor as yourself. *** NEXT SLIDE *** I like this short section of Proverbs chapter 4, because it gives us some straight-forward instructions on how to live according to God's Word: "²⁰ My son, be attentive to my words; incline your ear to my sayings. ²¹ Let them not escape from your sight; keep them within your heart. ²² For they are life to those who find them, and healing to all their flesh. ²³ Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life."

King Solomon wrote most of the Book of Proverbs and here we hear him telling his own son about how to live according to God's Word. King Solomon says to his son: listen to what I'm telling you. "Let [God's teachings] not escape from your sight; keep them within your heart. For they are life to those who find them, and healing to all their flesh."

Keep the truths of God's Word tucked into your heart and mind. You do this by memorizing Scripture portions, and then reviewing those Scripture portions over and over again until they become so much a part of you that you weave them into your daily speech.

King Solomon continues: "Put away from you crooked speech, and put devious talk far from you. ²⁵ Let your eyes look directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you. ²⁶ Ponder the path of your feet; then all your ways will be sure. ²⁷ Do not swerve to the right or to the left; turn your foot away from evil."

Here King Solomon gets right to the heart of the matter—things you can do every day to keep yourself focused on Jesus and the truths of from His Holy Word. "*Put away from you crooked speech, and put devious talk far from you.*" Speak with clean words. Avoid using cuss words. When you think God-focused ideas, then most likely God-focused ideas will come out of your mouth.

When you speak the truth in love to everyone, who you meet, then you are living the way God desires you to live. When you use kind words to everyone, who you meet, then you are living the way God desires for you to live. Our words can build up mightily, and our words can destroy terribly.

In addition to speaking only kind words to one another, King Solomon teaches that it's also important to pay attention to what you are looking at. *"Let your eyes look directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you."* Are you looking at other people through the lens that other people are made in God's image and his likeness, or are you looking at other people as though they are objects to be used and abused?

In this day and age, it's so easy to not see people—to only see strangers as inanimate objects not a human being made in God's image and likeness. This is why God wants you to *"Let your eyes look directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you."*

As you keep your eyes looking forward, God encourages you to keep your eyes fixed on HIM. Keep looking to Jesus, the author and perfector of your faith. When you keep looking to Jesus, then you'll always know where you are going.

King Solomon then goes on to talk about the importance of staying on the straight and narrow. "Ponder the path of your feet; then all your ways will be sure.²⁷ Do not swerve to the right or to the left; turn your foot away from evil."

When we get going, we can sometimes get distracted and easily led astray. Then we stop focusing on the important things in life—like living according to God's Word—and neglecting a lot of other positive things in our lives.

It's really important in this day and age to "Ponder the path of your feet; then all your ways 11

will be sure. ²⁷ *Do not swerve to the right or to the left; turn your foot away from evil.* " When you do not swerve to the right to the left, then you are staying on the right path. Regularly filling up with the truth from God's Word helps you to navigate through the on-going challenges that are thrown at you.

King Solomon wrote extensively about dealing with life's daily challenges. In Proverbs chapter one, he talks about the importance of keeping the truths of God's Word close to your heart and mind in order to not get led astray down a path that only leads to death. From Proverbs chapter one beginning at verse eight:

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

⁴⁸ Hear, my son, your father's instruction, and forsake not your mother's teaching, ⁹ for they are a graceful garland for your head and pendants for your neck. ¹⁰ My son, if sinners entice you, do not consent. ¹¹ If they say, 'Come with us, let us lie in wait for blood; let us ambush the innocent without reason; ¹² like Sheol let us swallow them alive, and whole, like those who go down to the pit; ¹³ we shall find all precious goods, we shall fill our houses with plunder; ¹⁴ throw in your lot among us; we will all have one purse"—¹⁵ my son, do not walk in the way with them; hold back your foot from their paths, ¹⁶ for their feet run to evil, and they make haste to shed blood. ¹⁷ For in vain is a net spread in the sight of any bird, ¹⁸ but these men lie in wait for their own blood; they set an ambush for their own lives. ¹⁹ Such are the ways of everyone who is greedy for unjust gain; it takes away the life of its possessors." (Proverbs 1:8-19)

Here King Solomon is laying out a straight-forward situation that he wants to use as a teaching moment with his son. "⁸ Hear, my son, your father's instruction, and forsake not your mother's teaching, ⁹ for they are a graceful garland for your head and pendants for your neck. ¹⁰ My son, if sinners entice you, do not consent. ¹¹ If they say, 'Come with us, let us lie in wait for blood; let us ambush the innocent without reason; ¹² like Sheol let us swallow them alive, and whole, like those who go down to the pit; ¹³ we shall find all precious goods, we shall fill our houses with plunder; ¹⁴ throw in your lot among us; we will all have one purse"

You might be thinking—when was the last time my friends or acquaintances enticed me to go kill someone else? Maybe never, but when was the last time a friend, a coworker, a family member suggested that you do something that was illegal—stealing something from the internet without paying for it—greedily sharing gossip with everyone, who you meet at the Beef-N-Brew—slandering and be-traying a neighbor or worker and then boasting about it to everyone down at B-P?

These are all the same things that King Solomon is getting at in these verses in Proverbs chapter one. "¹⁰ My son, if sinners entice you, do not consent. ¹¹ If they say, 'Come with us, let us lie in wait for blood; let us ambush the innocent without reason; ¹² like Sheol let us swallow them alive, and whole, like those who go down to the pit; ¹³ we shall find all precious goods, we shall fill our houses with plunder; ¹⁴ throw in your lot among us; we will all have one purse"

King Solomon knows that there are and will be plenty of people, who regularly and faithfully do evil things against other people without cause. Evil will continue to be present in our lives until the day when Jesus returns one last time and takes us all to be with him in his presence for all eternity.

King Solomon goes on to explain why it's important to avoid evil people—even people, who are close to use, who entice us to sin against God and against someone else—to break every commandment possible.

¹⁵ my son, do not walk in the way with them; hold back your foot from their paths, ¹⁶ for their feet run to evil, and they make haste to shed blood. ¹⁷ For in vain is a net spread in the sight of any bird,

¹⁸ but these men lie in wait for their own blood; they set an ambush for their own lives. ¹⁹ Such are the ways of everyone who is greedy for unjust gain; it takes away the life of its possessors." (Pr. 1:15-19)

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

Here in verse 15, King Solomon warns his son—and us—to stay away from evil people, who will try to lead us astray. This is why in Proverbs chapter four, King Solomon encourages his son—and us—to stay on the straight and narrow—"...to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith."

When we keep our eyes on Jesus, then we know we'll stay on the right path. When we keep memorizing Scripture portions, then we know that the truth of God's Word will grow in our hearts and minds.

When we neglect reading or listening to God's Word—when we neglect gathering in worship to receive from God all that he wants to give you—when we think we've got it all under control and don't need God—then we are setting ourselves up for failure.

But when we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus—keep walking on the straight and narrow of God's Word—then we are living the way God encourages us to live. *"For the grace of God... teaches us to say 'No' to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in this present age."* (Titus 2:11-12)

So when we fill up with Jesus, then are constantly equipping ourselves with a sure foundation. When we regularly fill up with Jesus, then we are able to confidently put on the full armor of God—as we talked about last week.

When we walk in the way we should go, then we living according to the Second Greatest Commandment: love your neighbor as yourself. "Let [the teachings from God's Word] not escape from your sight; keep them within your heart. ²² For they are life to those who find them, and healing to all their flesh. ²³ Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life."

God's Word is true, and right, and gives life to those who find it. When we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, then we are on the right path. Seek the Lord while he may be found. Call upon him while he is near. To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Back to the Basics A Review of our Christian Faith June—August 2021

Well, we're one month into our three-month summer sermon series and Bible study. We've reviewed so far, the Ten Commandments and "Confession and Office of the Keys." In July, we'll be studying the Lord's Prayer and the three creeds: Apostles', Nicene and Athanasian.

I have three goals for us as we continue walking through this summer program. The first goal is to review *Luther's Small Catechism* since it is a summary of the core truths of the Christian faith. Everything in the *Small Catechism* comes out of the Bible. One key point that is highlighted at the beginning of each section of the *Small Catechism* is this: "As the head of the family should teach...in a simple way to his household."

The *Small Catechism* was created to be used by parents to teach their children and grandchildren and any other young people for whom they are responsible the core truths of the Bible. The *Small Catechism* can and should also be used by adults to remind themselves what they learned in Confirmation class so many years ago. Even Luther has said that just because you are older now is no excuse to stop learning every day from God's Word.

The second goal of this "Review of our Christian Faith" is to become more comfortable with your Bible by keeping the follow truths in mind. We've discussed all five of these truths during the first five weeks of our sermon series and Bible study. Here they are summarized:

The Bible is about forgiveness and life in Jesus.

Scripture interprets Scripture.

Testament interprets Testament.

Words do things.

God the Holy Spirit helps us.

The third goal of this summer program is to have a weekly Take-Home point. The easiest and most readily available Take-Home points are short Scripture passages that are categorized in the "Table of Duties" near the end of the *Small Catechism*.

Sometimes we make things more difficult than they are in regards to how we are to live as Christians and how the Word of God applies to my life specifically. The "Table of Duties" is subtitled: "Certain passages of Scripture for various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities."

When you read through this section, you'll see that Luther considers ALL positions in society as "holy" including husband, wife, employee and employer.

And if you haven't done so, pick up a Bible reading plan or go on the church's website (<u>www.stmatthewmapleton.org</u>) and check under "Our Church" and then "Newsletters" to find the PDF document titled: "New Testament 3 Month Plan," and keep reading!
