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""Back to the Basics"

A Review of our Christian Faith

Sermon Title: Apostles' Creed—Part B

Sermon Text: Colossians 3:1-4; Romans 8:9-11

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Last Sunday, we talked about the first part of the Apostles' Creed. We focused on God the Father and how he created the entire world that we know and see, and how he created all life including human beings.

We also looked at how Jesus was with God before the beginning of time—that Jesus existed with God the Father and God the Holy Spirit BEFORE the world existed and before we human beings were created. Today we're going to talk about the last half of the Apostles' Creed—Jesus' resurrection from the dead and the Third Article, which talks about God the Holy Spirit.

The Apostles' Creed is divided into three parts—each part focusing on one person of the Trinity—God the Father and Creation, God the Son and Redemption, and God the Holy Spirit and Sanctification. As we look at the last half of the Apostles' Creed, we're going to focus on Jesus' resurrection from the dead and the work of God the Holy Spirit in our lives. In the Apostles' Creed: the Second Article, we confess:

I believe "...in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary"—which reminds us that Jesus is truly God and truly man. That Jesus "suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell."—that Jesus actually died. Some heretical ideas of the day—which still exist in our day and age—is that Jesus wasn't really God or that he was God, but that he switched places with some other man so that Jesus didn't actually die but another man died.

We continue confessing our faith in the Apostles' Creed: the Second Article: "The third day [Jesus] rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead."—which proves that God is ruler over life AND death. That the devil is still in submission to God our Heavenly Father.

The fact that Jesus suffered on a cross and died a horrible death FOR YOU, for me, and for ALL PEOPLE shows how far God our Heavenly Father will go to bring us back from going astray and keep us from going to hell by our own devices.

God loves you so much, and he wants to be with you for all eternity. This is why he sent Jesus, the only God-man, who could live life exactly according to the Ten Commandments, and then who willingly was crucified in order to give you and me a new life—a life with him in eternity.

Paul talks about this new life—that you get from believing in Jesus—and then through your baptism—in his letter to the Christians at Colosse. "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. ³ For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory." (Colossians 3:1-4)

You have been raised with Christ when you confess your faith in the One True God using one of three creeds—the Apostles', Nicene or Athanasian—and then you are washed in the waters of Holy Baptism. This means that you will then spend eternity with God in heaven.

Of course, if you reject God, then God will not force you to be with him in heaven. I don't understand how some people never read or listen to God's Word—never fill up with the Body and Blood of Jesus in Holy Communion—never gather with other Christians to receive from God all that he wants to give them, and yet talk like they are destined for heaven when they die, simply because they are—in their own eyes and own definition—a good person—whatever that means.

Jesus tells us clearly in Matthew chapter seven: "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. ²² On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' ²³ And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'" (Matthew 7:21-23)

This what we confess in the Athanasian Creed: "Whoever desires to be saved must, above all, hold the catholic"—that is, the Christian—"faith. Whoever does not keep it whole and undefiled will without doubt perish eternally.... Therefore, whoever desires to be saved must think thus about the Trinity." (Athanasian Creed #1-2)

Why do we have to think about the Trinity—and the Unity of this Trinity—in order to be saved? Because the Triune God is who we worship—is who we believe in. If you don't believe in the Trinity or the Unity of the Trinity, then you have no assurance of going to heaven when you die.

The writers of the Athanasian Creed also stress the importance of believing in the Triune God, because when we believe in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, we are confessing this faith with every other Christian, who believes the same thing. Therefore, when we confess the Unity of the Trinity and the Trinity in Unity, we are also confessing that we believe the same thing as many other believers around the world.

In addition to talking about the Trinity and the Unity of the Trinity, the Athanasian Creed continues talking about our core beliefs: "But it is also necessary for everlasting salvation that one faithfully believe the incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ.... At His coming all people will rise again with their bodies and give an account concerning their own deeds. And those who have done good

will enter into eternal life, and those who have done evil into eternal fire. This is the catholic faith; whoever does not believe it faithfully and firmly cannot be saved. (Athanasian Creed #26-27, 38-40)

This can sound harsh and uncaring to some people, but it is still the biblical truth. God's Word can be like a sword or spear, penetrating into your bones and marrow, convicting you of your sins and then offering you God's gracious forgiveness, to everyone, who confesses his or her sins.

God's Word is not meant to be a bland, vague group of stories meant to make you feel good. On the contrary, "...the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. ¹³ And no creature is hidden from his sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give account." (Hebrews 4:12-13)

This is why some people hate Christians and hate God, because they want to live a way that is contrary to God's Word, and the Holy Spirit through God's Word has convicted them—making them get angry or frustrated. God's Word doesn't just convict you of something you're doing contrary to what He desires, God's Word also teaches the truth.

The Scriptures teach us that since our first parents—Adam and Eve—sinned against God, that sin and death and terrible, awful experiences are part of our natural lives. Sin has been with us since the beginning and will be with us until the end—when Jesus comes back One Last Time. At that time, Jesus will take all believers to be with him in heaven, and Jesus will send all unbelievers to hell.

In several New Testament letters, Paul talks about the importance of believing in Jesus as Lord and Savior. Paul also talks about how the Holy Spirit comes to you when you are baptized and brought out of spiritual darkness into God's glorious, life-giving light. This is what Paul wrote to the Christians at Rome:

"⁹ You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰ But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹ If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit who dwells in you." (Romans 8:9-11)

Paul points out that as a child of God who has been redeemed by the shed blood of Jesus, you are an heir of God's Kingdom. As a child of God, Jesus sent you the Holy Spirit at your baptism. "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, ²⁰ for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body." (1 Corinthians 6:19-20)

As a child of God, you now belong to the Triune God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And it's so much better to belong to the Triune God than to belong to the Devil, the world and our sinful nature. If you aren't a child of God, then you don't belong to God.

If you don't regularly read or listen to God's Word, then how will you know the truth from God's Word? If you don't regularly gather with other believers in worship to receive from God his

Body and Blood in Holy Communion, then how can you get fed with the Bread of Life?

Maybe, some folks have convinced themselves that they don't need to come to church—that they can still be an isolated, independent Christian without gathering with other believers. That might be an option for a while, but if you're an isolated, independent Christian, who never gathers with other believers, then you'll never grow in your faith—you'll never get fed with the Bread of Life in Holy Communion. And just as when you stop eating, you start losing lots of weight, and you can become weak and sickly, when you stop feeding on the Bread of Life in Holy Communion, then you also will start becoming spiritually sick and weak.

This is why Paul talks about the importance of feeding regularly on God's Word so you remember everyday WHO you are, and what Jesus has done for you to give you new life. From Romans chapter 8: "9 You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰ But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹ If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit who dwells in you." (Romans 8:9-11)

As a redeemed child of God, who has been washed in the waters of Holy Baptism, you have been given the Holy Spirit, who lives in your body—which is a temple for the Holy Spirit. This is a gift from God—not by your works or your own ideas—but by the power of God Almighty, Maker of Heaven and earth.

The Apostles' Creed: the Third Article Meaning explains how our bodies become a temple for the Holy Spirit. "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith." The Holy Spirit creates faith in me and then continues to nurture that faith. The on-going nurturing is called "sanctification." Of course, the Holy Spirit does this for ALL believers around the world.

The Apostles' Creed: the Third Article meaning continues explaining the work of the Holy Spirit in ALL believers around the world: "In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ. This is most certainly true."

The Holy Spirit's job is to create faith in you. To call you to hear God's Word preached and taught. To encourage you to regularly read or listen to the truths about Jesus. And, finally, the Holy Spirit's job is to continually keep you in the truth of God's Word, because God knows that we live in a broken world in which it is easy to get led astray by all kinds of thoughts and ideas.

"You are not your own, ²⁰ for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body." You are not your own. You belong to God. God the Holy Spirit lives in you, teaching you daily the truths of God's Word. Are you listening to the Holy Spirit or are you listening to what the world is telling you?

You belong to God, because the Holy Spirit created faith in you, and then nurtures that faith in you to keep you in the true faith written in the Scriptures. And this is why it's so important to fill up with Jesus on a daily basis. When you read or listen to God's Word every day, then you are equipping yourself every day for the work that God has prepared for you to do.

When you fill up with Jesus, then you are giving the Holy Spirit lots of great material to work with in your life. This is what we confess in the Apostles' Creed: the Third Article Meaning: "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, // enlightened me with His gifts, // sanctified and kept me in the true faith."

The Holy Spirit creates faith in you. Then the Holy Spirit continues to nurture that faith in you—teaching you all that you need to know about Jesus and what he has done for you through his death and resurrection from the dead. The Holy Spirit keeps you in the one true faith found in Jesus Christ alone, because he wants you to regularly be equipped to live in this sinful, broken world.

The secular world dumps all kinds of junk in your mind. Empty out the junk that the world tries to pour into you, and fill up with Jesus and His Holy Word. Regularly read or listen to God's Word. Pray and ask God to help you to understand the part of Scripture that you're reading or listening to. This is one way that the Holy Spirit keeps you in the one true faith found in Jesus Christ alone. Seek the Lord while he may be found. Call up on him while he is near. To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.


