"Back to the Basics" A Review of our Christian Faith

14th Sunday after Pentecost 29 August 2021

St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA
Deuteronomy 4:1–2, 6–9 / Psalm 119:129–136 / Ephesians 6:10–20 / Mark 7:14–23

Sermon Title: Table of Duties: Husbands & Wives; Parents & Youth; Widows & Everyone Sermon Text: 1 Timothy 2:1-4; 1 Peter 3:7-8; Ephesians 6:4

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Today is our last day of our three-month summer sermon series and Bible study. We have reviewed all six chief parts of Luther's Small Catechism—the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the three creeds—Apostles', Nicene and Athanasian—the two sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. We have also reviewed Confession and Absolution and the Office of the Keys. Two Sundays ago, we talked about the Table of Duties, and today we're going to talk about the rest of the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties has this subtitle: "Certain passages of Scripture for various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." When Martin Luther talks about "various holy orders" he isn't talking about priests or nuns. When Martin Luther talks about "various holy orders" he is actually talking about you and your daily life—moms and dads—workers and employees—and so on.

The Table of Duties is basically a short section that talks about what you should do as you fill a specific role in life and society. "Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, // son, daughter, // husband, wife, or worker?" (Small Catechism: Confession/ Keys) Whatever role you fill you can start by looking to the Table of Duties as to what the Bible says about the "holy order" in which God has placed you.

The Table of Duties gives you a starting point as to what the Bible says for your position in society. The Table of Duties is not an exhaustive list. It's simply a short list to get you thinking about who you are as a child of God. Are you father or mother? Are you a child? Are you a worker or employer? How do you fit in society?

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

Today we're going to see what the Table of Duties says about families: husbands and wives, children and parents, and all people. The first text I want us to look at talks about praying for all people, who are in authority.

"First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, ² for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and

quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. ³ This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, ⁴ who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. " (1 Timothy 2:1-4)

Even though this passage from First Timothy talks about praying "...for kings and all who are in high positions...", this passage also reminds all of us that we are to pray for all people, who are in authority over you. So, who is in authority over you? Our nation's president. Our state governor. Our local mayor. In the church, who is in authority over you? Our national church President Matt Harrison. Our state church president—Pastor Steve Turner. Our local congregation—Pastor LaBoube and all the elders.

We all have someone in authority over us even though our culture lately has been bucking this idea. God created our world with people being in authority. In fact, in the Confirmation class we talk about this idea when we discuss the Fourth Commandment: "Honor your father and mother."

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

The Fourth Commandment: "Honor your father and mother" includes more than just your parents. Luther's Small Catechism explains: "What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them."

The Fourth Commandment includes your parents, and "...other authorities." Here is a reminder that throughout your whole life there are different people, who are in authority over you. Now, just because you have people in authority over you, doesn't mean that those people are to abuse their power and twist your arm to make you do something that you don't want to do.

The Scriptures teach us that when we have people in authority over us, we are also to submit to their leadership and authority. When you submit to the people, who are in authority over you, then you are voluntarily accepting and recognizing their leadership—their guidance—their direction. After all, you and I are not able to do and be all things.

You can't be the president of the United States, and be the Iowa State governor, and be the Mapleton mayor, and be the president of our congregation all at the same time. You aren't able to do all these jobs, because God has not put you in that position right now.

God tells us in His Holy Word how he has put you in the position in society where he wants you to be right now. "Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, // son, daughter, // husband, wife, or worker?" (Small Catechism: Confession/ Keys) Whatever role you fill you can start by looking to the Table of Duties as to what the Bible says about the "holy order" in which God has placed you.

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

Today, we're going to look at the Table of Duties as to what it means to be a husband or wife and a parent or child. First Peter chapter three talks about how you are to live as a husband and wife. "Likewise, husbands, live with your wives in an understanding way, showing honor to the woman as the weaker vessel, since they are heirs with you of the grace of life, so that your prayers may not be hindered. ⁸ Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind." (1 Peter 3:7-8)

There is quite a bit in the Scriptures that tell husbands how they are to live with their wives—

how husbands are to be the head of the household. And, since Luther's Small Catechism was written as a teaching tool, husbands and fathers can use this resource to teach their children and anyone else in their care, the chief parts of the Christian faith.

Husbands are to love their wives as Jesus loves the church. In other words, husbands are to be sacrificial in their serving their wife and their children. Serving your wife and children doesn't mean that you give them everything that they want. Serving your wife and children means that you are aware of their physical needs providing for them ".... clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home..."

As the husband, and head of the household, you are to also provide for their spiritual health and well-being, teaching your wife and children the chief parts of the Christian faith as we have been reviewing over these past three months. Of course, husbands and fathers able to teach the chief parts of the Christian faith to your family when you fill up with Jesus regularly.

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

The Table of Duties also gives us a little insight into how wives are to live. "Wives, submit to your husbands as to the Lord." (Ephesians 5:22) "They were submissive to their own husbands, like Sarah, who obeyed Abraham and called him her master. You are her daughters if you do what is right and do not give way to fear." (1 Peter 3:5–6)

Now, when we read in the Bible the word "submit" some people get upset and frustrated easily. Biblical understanding of "submit" is that you voluntarily follow the leadership and authority of someone else. You willingly follow the authority of your spouse, your pastor and the elders, your city mayor, and so forth.

The Scriptures talk a lot about how wives are to live. Wives are to love and respect their husbands just as Jesus loves and respects you. The reason that God created authority and leadership is so that there could be order in our daily lives.

If there were a hundred presidents of the United States, how would you know which president to follow? If there were a dozen state governors, how would you know which governor to follow? If there are two parents leading a family—and neither parent looks to the best interests of the other parent—then it would seem that there would be constant chaos in who is helping to lead the family.

Instead, God created order in our lives for our benefit. God created one national leader for our country. God created one governor to leader our state. God created one head of the household for the benefit of our families.

And as I have been saying all throughout this sermon series and Bible study—the Small Catechism is a teaching tool. It is a resource to be used by the head of the household to teach those people under his care and concern the chief parts of the Christian faith.

Paul talks about how fathers and heads of household are to live in Ephesians chapter six verse four: "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." (Ephesians 6:4)

Paul wants to encourage all fathers to teach their children and grandchildren the truths from God's Word on a regular basis. That's why we have the Small Catechism—to help us fathers do that. Paul also wants to remind fathers, though, that they should be gentle and patient in teaching their children.

And then, the couple of verses earlier, Paul talks about how children are to live: "Children,

obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother'—which is the first commandment with a promise—'that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth.'" (Ephesians 6:1-3)

Paul then reminds children that they are to obey their parents—to submit to their leadership and their care and concern. Children should remember that their parents know what is best for them, even when children don't like what is happening.

And in First Peter chapter five, Paul also talks about how children and young people are to live: "Young men, in the same way be submissive to those who are older. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, because, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that He may lift you up in due time." (1 Peter 5:5–6)

*** NEXT SLIDE ***

All throughout the Bible, God tells us that we are to love and respect our parents and other authorities over us. The authority in your life starts at the top with our federal government—our president—and goes all the way down to our local mayor and even our congregational leaders.

God created order in this world which includes voluntarily submitting to the people, who are in authority over you. Submitting to people, who are in leadership and authority over you also includes husbands and wives and parents and children.

The Table of Duties near the end of the Small Catechism helps you to "Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, // son, daughter, // husband, wife, or worker?" (Small Catechism: Confession/Keys) The Table of Duties is a short summary of what the Bible teaches about every position in society.

This is another reason to read or listen to the Bible every day. When you read or listen to the Bible every day you will slowly know more about what God asks of you—what he desires of you—how he wants you to live as a husband—wife—worker—employer—father—child—and many more "holy orders" in our society. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.



Back to the Basics A Review of our Christian Faith June—August 2021

Over the last three months, we have spent a lot of time digging into Scripture and reviewing the core truths of our Christian faith. We have been using Luther's Small Catechism as our outline for the topics each week. During this summer sermon series and Bible study, I had three goals. They were:

Review the *Small Catechism* as a basic outline of the Christian faith. Each section in the *Small Catechism* begins with this phrase: "As the head of the family should teach...in a simple way to his household."

Become comfortable with your Bible so that you eagerly open it and read or listen to all that God wants you to know about how much he loves you and all that he did FOR YOU.

Have a take-home truth to apply to your daily life. The "Table of Duties" is one place to get started to see how you are to live and act the way God desires.

During this sermon series and Bible study, we have reviewed the six chief parts of Luther's Small Catechism which are:

Ten Commandments

Apostles' Creed

Lord's Prayer

Holy Baptism

Confession, Absolution and Office of the Keys

Holy Communion

Along with reviewing the six chief parts of the Christian faith, we had a Bible reading plan to read through the entire New Testament in three months. How did that go? Are you nearly finished with the Bible reading plan? As with any Bible reading plan, my desire is that you work on developing a habit to read or listen to a little bit of the Bible every day.

In addition to the six chief parts of the Christian faith in the Small Catechism, there are three more parts near the end of the Small Catechism that are equally important:

Daily Prayers

Table of Duties

Christian Questions with their Answers

The whole point of the Small Catechism is that it's a teaching tool, a resource to be used by parents or grandparents to teach the core truths of God's Word to the young people in their care. Of course, the Small Catechism is also a resource that parents and grandparents can use to review what they learned years ago in Confirmation. God bless you and may you continue to hunger and thirst for God's Word every day.
