St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Isaiah 50:4–10 / Psalm 116:1–9 / James 3:1–12 / Mark 9:14–29

Sermon Title: You Bless and Curse with Your Tongue Sermon Text: James 3:1-12

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Our text for this morning's messages is the Epistle lesson from James chapter three. "James addresses practical issues and enduring problems faced by many mature believers: impatience, // failure to do what you know what is right, // favoritism, apathy, and selfishness. He presents wise arguments and God-pleasing solutions, // culminating in the confession of sins and pray for help from God, *'the Father of lights'* (5:16) who gives *'every good gift and every perfect gift'* (1:17)" (Concordia Self-Study Bible, p. 2130)

This is one reason I like the Book of James. He says it like it is. And, sometimes when James talks about a very real situation going on in your very real life, his words can sting. That is the nature of God's Word. God's Word shows us where in our lives we are sinning against God and against someone else. God's Word also teaches us the way God wants us to live. God's Word also encourages us to keep moving forward when we are struggling.

This is what the author of the Book of Hebrews tells us: "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. And no creature is hidden from his sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give account." (Hebrews 4:12-13) This is why some folks can get bristly when you share a bit of truth from God's Word.

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In our text for today James isn't just talking about gossip, but that gossip is one of the many outcomes from your tongue. "<sup>3</sup> If we put bits into the mouths of horses so that they obey us, we guide their whole bodies as well. <sup>4</sup> Look at the ships also: though they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. <sup>5</sup> So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great things. How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire! <sup>6</sup> And the tongue is a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the entire course of life, and set on fire by hell." (James 3:3-6)

Have you ever thought of your tongue being able to set an entire forest on fire? When we talk

about "burning our bridges" this is exactly what is happening. Our tongues are the spark of fire that causes the demise of a relationship.

James points out that our tongues, unfortunately, cannot be tamed like an animal by putting "bits into the mouths of horses so that they obey us..." Sadly, James stresses that "the tongue is a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body..."

James is talking about YOUR TONGUE. My tongue. Our tongues are just like a spark that ignites a field of dry corn. That field won't have a chance. And neither do we. In fact, James says that our bodies become stained by the evil that our tongue produces.

What evil does the tongue produce? Think about the last argument you had with a fellow church member. Have you ever reconciled with that fellow believer in Christ or have you just given up on that other person and spend the rest of your life never speaking to that person?

Another evil from our tongue that is talked about a lot in Scripture is gossip. When was the last time you gossiped at the Beef and Brew? When was the last time you gossiped over the telephone? In church? At the grocery store?

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James goes on talking about how the tongue can never be tamed. "<sup>7</sup> For every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by mankind, <sup>8</sup> but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. <sup>9</sup> With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. <sup>10</sup> From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so. <sup>11</sup> Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and salt water? <sup>12</sup> Can a fig tree, my brothers, bear olives, or a grapevine produce figs? Neither can a salt pond yield fresh water. (James 3:7-12)

James saw in his day and age, and God prompted James to write about the same problems in our day and age—the problem of using your tongue for evil. What strikes me here are verses 9 and 10: "With [our tongue] we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. <sup>10</sup> From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so." (James 3:9-10)

We use our tongue for many things including gossip, slander, evil and wicked ideas. We also use our tongue to praise, thank and worship our Lord and our Savior, Jesus Christ. Using our tongue for good and bad is what the Eighth Commandment talks about.

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"You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor." And <u>Luther's Small Catechism</u> explains: "What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way."

Every Commandment tells us what God doesn't want us to do, and tells us what God wants us to do. First, God tells us in the meaning of the Eighth Commandment that "We should fear and love

God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation..."

The Eighth Commandment is kind of a summary of our text from James. God tells us that you are to fear and love him as you pursue and nurture your relationships. As you pursue and nurture your relationships, you are NOT to tell lies about your neighbor to everyone, who you meet. You are NOT to betray your neighbor in anyway. You are NOT to slander or hurt your neighbor with your words and deeds.

Instead, how are you to relate to your neighbor? The Small Catechism tells us that you are to "...defend him, // speak well of him, // and explain everything in the kindest way." You are to stand up for your neighbor when you know that he is being falsely accused. You are to speak well of your neighbor when you are in town—when you are at the Beef-n-Brew—when you are at the barber shop. After all, wouldn't you like it if your neighbor spoke WELL OF YOU to everyone who he met?

You are to explain everything to him in the kindest way. You shouldn't just let your neighbor go and sin when you have the power and words to teach him to the right way to live and act. In fact, every Christian should live this way. Every Christian should be willing to help your wayward neighbor get on the straight and narrow of God's Word. You should like it when your neighbor explained something to you in a kind, friendly way, as opposed to treating you like you're an idiot, wouldn't you? We all would like that.

Of course, you are only able to teach your neighbor the truth from God's Word after you yourself fill up with Jesus and his truth. When you fill up with Jesus, then you have godly truth to pour out to your neighbor.

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James highlights an important point about your tongue: <sup>9</sup> With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. <sup>10</sup> From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so. <sup>11</sup> Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and salt water? <sup>12</sup> Can a fig tree, my brothers, bear olives, or a grapevine produce figs? Neither can a salt pond yield fresh water. (James 3:9-12)

Out of your mouth—your tongue—can do amazing and wonderful things. Your tongue can bless and praise and thank the Lord our God. You tongue can build up your fellow members of our congregation. Your tongue can be a source of encouragement to your neighbor.

Of course, James reminds us that your tongue can also do tremendous damage. Your tongue can tear down a fellow Christian. Your tongue can destroy a relationship quickly. Your tongue can be "...a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the entire course of life, and set on fire by hell."

Even though you an I are able to do immeasurable damage with our tongues, we are also able to do immeasurable blessing with our tongues. Paul talks about how your tongue can build up or

tear down in his letter to the Philippians: "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves.<sup>4</sup> Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others." (Philippians 2:3-4)

When you use your tongue to bless God and bless others, you are looking not only to your own interest, but also to the interest of those around you. Even though James describes your tongue as "...*a restless evil, full of deadly poison*" there is still hope.

The hope you have is in Christ Jesus, "...who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men.<sup>8</sup> And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." (Philippians 2:6-8)

Jesus came and took on human flesh and served us, even though our tongues have previously cursed him. Jesus willingly served us, because—no matter how hard we try—we cannot serve ourselves. It is Christ Jesus alone, who sets us free to live a life that is holy and pleasing to God our Heavenly Father. As part of setting us free from the power of sin, death and the devil, we are able to use our tongue to bless and praise and worship our God and Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Praise the Lord, O my soul. Praise all his benefits to me. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

## How to Pray: A 6-Step Guide to Prayer https://blog.youversion.com/2021/04/how-to-pray-a-6-step-guide-to-prayer/ 2021-04-06

"Prayer." When you see that word, what thoughts or images come to mind? Does talking to God come easy to you? Or do you struggle to pray? Knowing what to say to God doesn't always feel easy, and sometimes, prayer gets weighed down by our misconceptions about what a conversation with God should look like.

*"Pray then like this..."* 2,000 years ago, Jesus taught His disciples to *"Pray then like this: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name.* <sup>10</sup> *Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.* <sup>11</sup> *Give us this day our daily bread,* <sup>12</sup> *and forgive us our debts, as we also have for-given our debtors.* <sup>13</sup> *And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil."* (Matthew 6:9-13)

This is now a famous example on how to pray. But how do we apply it to our everyday 21stcentury lives? First, we need to understand how not to pray. Before teaching the Lord's Prayer, Jesus told His disciples, *"when you pray, pray to your Father in private … "* and, *"do not heap up empty phrases … for your Father knows what you need before you ask Him."* 

If God already knows what we need, then prayer isn't simply about the words we say. If we're praying to impress people, or if we're treating prayer like a box to check, then we're missing out on the power of prayer.

Prayer is, and always will be, a dynamic conversation with God. When we realize this, the Lord's Prayer becomes a freeing framework that helps us talk to God every day. Here's a 6-step guide to prayer that can help:

## Refocus on God: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name.'

Inhale deeply and focus on these words: "*Our Father in heaven*." Slowly exhale as you say: "*Holy is Your name*." Repeat this several times, and pay attention to any aspects of God's character that come to mind. Spend this time focusing on how great God is.

## Realign your will: 'Your kingdom come ... '

God has always been in the process of carrying out His will on earth. So right now, reflect on this: when you align your will with God's will, you are actively seeking His Kingdom. Quiet any noise around you, and ask God to show you how you can take part in doing His will today.

#### Release your concerns: 'Give us this day our daily bread ... '

Imagine holding your hands out in front of you, as if you want God to put something in them. As you give God your concerns, what does He give you in return? List your concerns, and say them one at a time. Each time you voice a concern, try asking God to, *"give us this day our daily bread."* Sit with this exercise for as long as you need.

### Repent and respond: 'And forgive us ... as we forgive ... '

What are you holding onto that you need to lay down? Is there anything you need to confess right now? Maybe it's a hurt you can't let go of, a behavior you're struggling to change, an addiction you haven't conquered, or a mistake you keep making. God invites you to come as you are, and respond to Him. Tell him whatever is on your mind, then create space to hear from Him.

## Request God's protection: '... deliver us from evil ... '

We've all been rescued from something. What has God rescued you from? Thank Him for His faithfulness, and let Him know where you need help. Consider praying on behalf of other people who may also need protection. Remember that even when situations seem hopeless, there is nothing God cannot do.

## Rejoice and reflect.

Celebrate what God has done in your life, and look for ways to worship Him throughout your day. Then, spend a few minutes reflecting on this time with God. What has He shown you? Consider adding anything that stands out to your prayer list.

When we start to pray like Jesus did, we will start to experience intimacy with God like Jesus did. And when we let prayer shape the way we live, we start to realize that we can approach God at all times with confidence, vulnerability, and trust.
