Sermon Title: Serious and Deliberate Sins All the Time Sermon Text: Mark 9:38-50

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Our Gospel lesson for today can sound extreme and for good reason. God is reminding you that sin is awful—terrible. Unfortunately, though, too many Christians treat some sins as though they are not that important.

If God's Word is true—which it is—then how can we just decide what we think is really a sin and what really isn't a sin? And this is exactly what our society has been doing for years. Two generations back—back to my mom's mom and dad—my Grandma and Grandpa Rose—divorce was a serious issue. Couples did not divorce so quickly.

Now people divorce all the time, and no one blinks an eye. It seems too many people treat divorce as though it's just another option after you are married for a time instead of working on the marriage. And yet, Scripture clearly tells us that the only reason divorce should happen is marital unfaithfulness.

This is why Jesus tells you that "...if your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter life crippled than with two hands to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. 45 And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter life lame than with two feet to be thrown into hell. 47 And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out. It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into hell, 48 'where their worm does not die and the fire is not quenched.'" (Mark 9:44-48)

Jesus makes a bold, controversial statement, because sin is a serious problem. Sure, some Christians know what the Ten Commandments, and try to live by them. Unfortunately, though, it seems some Christians still give approval to certain sins simply because everyone else does so—

including unbelievers.

This is what Paul talks about in Romans chapter one: "And since they did not see fit to acknowledge God, God gave them up to a debased mind to do what ought not to be done. ²⁹ They were filled with all manner of unrighteousness, evil, covetousness, malice. They are full of envy, murder, strife, deceit, maliciousness. They are gossips, ³⁰ slanderers, haters of God, insolent, haughty, boastful, inventors of evil, disobedient to parents, ³¹ foolish, faithless, heartless, ruthless. ³² Though they know God's righteous decree that those who practice such things deserve to die, they not only do them but give approval to those who practice them." (Romans 1:28-32)

Since when are we Christians to take our cue from unbelievers? What do they have to offer us that God does not? Jesus tells us that if any part of your body causes you to sin, you should remove it you're yourself. That's why this text sounds extreme—because sin IS extreme, and God went to extreme lengths to save us from going to hell, because of our sins. ALL sin separates us from God. God cannot be in the presence of sin.

That's why all throughout the Scriptures we read that God wants us to confess our sins and receive his gracious, life-giving forgiveness. But until God the Holy Spirit convicts you and makes you see actual sins in your life, then you will probably just keep tripping along sinning without even realizing it.

42 "Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him if a great millstone were hung around his neck and he were thrown into the sea. 43 And if your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter life crippled than with two hands to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. 45 And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter life lame than with two feet to be thrown into hell. 47 And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out. It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into hell, 48 'where their worm does not die and the fire is not quenched.'" (Mark 9:42-48)

There have been times here after I preached a sermon during worship that I found out that a member of the church was offended by my message. When that happens, you can blame the pastor, but the reason you feel offended is that the Holy Spirit pricked your heart touching on an area in your life that God wants you to work on.

This is why I might hear later that a member of the church was offended by my sermon. That person was hearing from God the Holy Spirit to encourage that person to grow—by confessing any sin and receiving God's forgiveness, and then growing spiritually to understand from God's Word that whatever you are doing or saying, God wants you to work on that area of your life.

And yet, it's really sad to see how many people don't see a problem with all kinds of sin.

Recently, I read through Leviticus, and I saw how serious God takes sin—so serious that the person, who committed the sin, was to offer a bull or a lamb or some birds as a sacrifice and then they would receive God's forgiveness through the priest.

Think about that for a minute. What if every time you sinned, in order to be forgiven of your sins, and to have a clear conscious, you had to give up something valuable like your wedding ring or a one hundred dollars? If that were the case, I am pretty sure many people would stop caring—and stop thinking about their sins—especially if you had to give up something valuable every single time you sinned against God and against someone else.

And that would be sad, because when you stop caring whether you have sinned or not, then you're probably slowly not caring about God and His Holy Word. The entire Scriptures point us to Jesus and all that he experienced for you and for me and for all people.

There a number of rules in Leviticus for how to live with other people, especially how to deal with conflict with other people. The rules can seem long and drawn out, but they all point us to Jesus and his ultimate sacrificial death and resurrection from the dead.

From Leviticus 19: "You shall not steal; you shall not deal falsely; you shall not lie to one another. You shall not swear by my name falsely, and so profane the name of your God: I am the LORD." (Leviticus 19:11-12)

And, "You shall not hate your brother in your heart, but you shall reason frankly with your neighbor, lest you incur sin because of him. You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against the sons of your own people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD." (Leviticus 19:17-18)

This is why Jesus says that if your hand causes you to sin, then you should by all means cut off your hand! In order words, when your hand causes you to sin, then find a way to stop using your hand to sin. When your eye causes you to sin, Jesus says to gouge it out! Dealing with sin is THAT serious. Whatever causes you to sin, then get rid of it immediately!

And yet, I know how people behave. We hear that sin is terrible and that we need to stop doing it, but as soon as you go home, you might continue sinning without even realize it, because you have stopped thinking of your specific action as a sin.

When you hear about a family member or friend, breaking any one of the commandments, maybe you just think—well, that's not a good idea—but you don't actually do anything or say anything to that person.

Unbelievers—and us Christians—will all be judged on the Last Day when we stand before the throne of God our Heavenly Father. And one of your jobs as a believer in Jesus Christ is to share the truth of God's Word with other people, including people, who don't know God's Word.

It's God's Word that gives us the answer to this problem of sinning. The ultimate answer is Jesus. We started out talking about God's Law. God's Law tells us what we are supposed to do—how we are to live—how we are to relate to each other. God's Law never provides comfort and encouragement. God's Law only condemns. That's its purpose.

When you read or hear God's Law telling you what is a sin and that you should stop doing that sinful thought, word or deed, that's the whole purpose of the Law. The Law simply condemns you, because you are not able to "do better" no matter how hard you try.

The rest of this story is God's Gospel. God's Gospel tells and shows us what God has done for us. God's Gospel shows us Jesus, and how he suffered a horrible death so that you and I and all believers don't have to die for our thousands of sins we have committed.

God's Gospel shows us what God our Heavenly Father has done for us—to keep us from going to hell, which is where all unbelievers will go when they die. This is a very clear teaching in the Bible. God's Gospel shows us the immense love that God our Heavenly Father has for you and for me and for all his children. God's Gospel gives you and me comfort and encouragement.

So when you see how you have said or done something against God and against someone else, God the Holy Spirit is prompting you to confess your sins and receive God's gracious forgiveness. This is why Jesus tells you to cut off your hand if it causes you to sin, so that you will see that what you have said or done against God and against someone else is a sin, and will be prompted by God's Word to repent of your sins.

And yet, confessing your sins can also seem a very hard thing to do. Why? Because you don't want to acknowledge that you have done or said something against God and against someone else. You might not want to confess your sins, because you feel justified and right in what you said or did to someone else.

Luther's Small Catechism talks about the importance of confessing your sins. "What sins should we confess? Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even those we are not aware of, as we do in the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts."

So how do you know what sins to actually confess? "Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, // son, daughter, // husband, wife, or worker? Have you been disobedient, unfaithful, or lazy? Have you been hot-tempered, rude, or quarrelsome? Have you hurt someone by your words or deeds? Have you stolen, been negligent, wasted anything, or done any harm?" (Small Catechism: Confession/Keys Q2 & Q3)

Still, it can be hard to confess your sins, and yet God clearly tells us that if you don't confess your sins, then you won't receive his forgiveness. Luke tells us in his gospel: "And as you wish that

others would do to you, // do so to them." (Luke 6:31) So if you want people to treat you badly—lie to you—cheat you—then you should continue doing the same sinful actions and words to other people.

But that's not what Luke is saying. Luke tells us: "And as you wish that others would do to you, do so to them." (Luke 6:31) So that we will treat others according to the Second Greatest Commandment: Love your neighbor as yourself.

When you treat others the way you want to be treated, then you are living the way God wants you to live. When you live according to God's Word, then you recognize your sin, confess your sin to God, and then receive God's gracious forgiveness.

Living according to God's Word helps you to recognize temptations to sin and to flee from them—to run away from them as fast as you can. When you fill up with Jesus—when you read or listen to the Bible every day—then you will know the truth—truth that sets men free.

That truth will be contrary to popular thinking, but that truth leads you to life eternal through the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord. TO God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

How to Pray: A 6-Step Guide to Prayer

"Prayer." When you see that word, what thoughts or images come to mind? Does talking to God come easy to you? Or do you struggle to pray? Knowing what to say to God doesn't always feel easy, and sometimes, prayer gets weighed down by our misconceptions about what a conversation with God should look like.

"Pray then like this..." 2,000 years ago, Jesus taught His disciples to "⁹ Pray then like this: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. ¹⁰ Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. ¹¹ Give us this day our daily bread, ¹² and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. ¹³ And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." (Matthew 6:9-13)

This is now a famous example on how to pray. But how do we apply it to our everyday 21st-century lives? First, we need to understand how not to pray. Before teaching the Lord's Prayer, Jesus told His disciples, "when you pray, pray to your Father in private..." and, "do not heap up empty phrases...for your Father knows what you need before you ask Him."

If God already knows what we need, then prayer isn't simply about the words we say. If we're praying to impress people, or if we're treating prayer like a box to check, then we're missing out on the power of prayer.

Prayer is, and always will be, a dynamic conversation with God. When we realize this, the Lord's Prayer becomes a freeing framework that helps us talk to God every day. Here's a 6-step guide to prayer that can help:

Refocus on God: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name.'

Inhale deeply and focus on these words: "Our Father in heaven." Slowly exhale as you say: "Holy is Your name." Repeat this several times, and pay attention to any aspects of God's character that come to mind. Spend this time focusing on how great God is.

Realign your will: 'Your kingdom come ...'

God has always been in the process of carrying out His will on earth. So right now, reflect on this: when you align your will with God's will, you are actively seeking His Kingdom. Quiet any noise around you, and ask God to show you how you can take part in doing His will today.

Release your concerns: 'Give us this day our daily bread...'

Imagine holding your hands out in front of you, as if you want God to put something in them. As you give God your concerns, what does He give you in return? List your concerns, and say them one at a time. Each time you voice a concern, try asking God to, "give us this day our daily bread." Sit with this exercise for as long as you need.

Repent and respond: 'And forgive us ... as we forgive ...'

What are you holding onto that you need to lay down? Is there anything you need to confess right now? Maybe it's a hurt you can't let go of, a behavior you're struggling to change, an addiction you haven't conquered, or a mistake you keep making. God invites you to come as you are, and respond to Him. Tell him whatever is on your mind, then create space to hear from Him.

Request God's protection: '... deliver us from evil ...'

We've all been rescued from something. What has God rescued you from? Thank Him for His faithfulness, and let Him know where you need help. Consider praying on behalf of other people who may also need protection. Remember that even when situations seem hopeless, there is nothing God cannot do.

Rejoice and reflect.

Celebrate what God has done in your life, and look for ways to worship Him throughout your day. Then, spend a few minutes reflecting on this time with God. What has He shown you? Consider adding anything that stands out to your prayer list.

When we start to pray like Jesus did, we will start to experience intimacy with God like Jesus did. And when we let prayer shape the way we live, we start to realize that we can approach God at all times with confidence, vulnerability, and trust.

10 Reasons to Read the Bible
