St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Malachi 3:1–7b / Psalm 66:1–12 / Philippians 1:2–11 / Luke 3:1–20

> Sermon Title: What Does it Cost: Take up your Cross Sermon Text: Matthew 16.13-28

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Today we begin the second week of Advent. We continue talking about discipleship—inviting someone to walk alongside you, and to learn from you. If you are a teacher, pray about who you could invite to walk alongside you, and learn how to teach children, the adult Bible class or the Confirmation class. Whatever you do—even work outside the church—you can disciple someone else or you can be discipled by someone else.

Discipleship is primarily about relationship—the relationship that God has with us all because of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior. That relationship was broken back in the Garden of Eden, and it was only, because of Jesus that we are able to have a restored relationship with God.

So, who is Jesus? Think about that for a minute. It was the same question that Jesus asked his disciples—his followers. In those days, when a young man desires to learn from a certain teacher, he would follow that teacher around all the time, learning from him all the time in formal and informal situations. The student slowly became a disciple of that teacher. That's why the Scriptures talk about the twelve disciples and about discipleship on a larger scale.

13 Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' 14 And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, others say Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 15 He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' 16 Simon Peter replied, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.' 17 And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! (that is, Simon, son of Jonah) For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 16:13-17)

Jesus asks his disciples, who do the people say he is he. He isn't asking them, because he doesn't know. Jesus is asking them to hear them say what he knows is already in their hearts and minds. The disciples tell Jesus that some people say that he is the resurrected John the Baptist, or the resurrected Prophet Elijah or Jeremiah or another Old Testament prophet. But then, Jesus wants his disciples to share what he knows is on their hearts. Jesus asks them: *"Who do you say that I am?"*

Immediately, prompted by the work of the Holy Spirit, "Simon Peter replied, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Then, Jesus immediately points out that Simon Peter was able to proclaim that Jesus is the Messiah, who had been promised all throughout the Old Testament. "And

Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! (that is, Simon, son of Jonah) For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven."

Simon Peter was quickly prompted by the Holy Spirit to say boldly what he already believed—that Jesus IS the Son of God Most High. The other disciples likely believed the same thing even though Simon Peter answered first.

Then Jesus points out that it was the work of the Holy Spirit in Simon Peter to make such a bold confession. The same happens with you. When you fill up with Jesus, then you will know the truth and that truth will set you free from being in bondage to your sinful thoughts, words and actions. When you fill up with Jesus, then the Holy Spirit, who is living in you, will prompt you and encourage you to speak this word of truth from God's Word in every situation—even in very difficult situations.

The Holy Spirit does a lot more work in your life than you may realize—and that's okay. Sometimes it's good when you don't see the Holy Spirit working in you until something really important happens—or you get a tremendous insight into a bit of truth from the Bible that you had read a hundred times before.

I've experienced this myself, and I've heard some folks here tell me that the other day they were reading a passage of Scripture that they have read dozens of times before, and just the other day God opened their eyes to see an important point about that passage. That's a great example of the Holy Spirit working in your life.

The Holy Spirit prompts you to do the good works that God the Father has prepared in advance for you to do. The Holy Spirit equips you to do those good works that will glorify God and will build up those around you.

This is what Paul tells us in Ephesians chapter two: "For we are [God's] workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10)

These "good works" are what God offers you to do in order to fulfill the two Greatest Commandments—Love God and love your neighbor as yourself. If you don't know what "good works" God has prepared for you to do, then pray. Pray and ask God to show you what you should be doing in order to serve him by serving your neighbor. When God shows you what "good works' you should do, this is an example of the Holy Spirit working in you.

The Holy Spirit also encourages you when God prompts you to do something really hard something that you don't really want to do. This is what Jesus was getting at when he told his disciples the importance of keeping their eyes fixed on him at all times.

⁴²⁴ Then Jesus told his disciples, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. ²⁵ For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. ²⁶ For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?" (Matthew 16:24-26)

Taking up your cross and following Jesus ALL THE TIME is not always easy, but it is well worth it. Last Wednesday we talked about Paul starting out his life as a disciple of the Pharisees—living his life exactly according to the Law of Moses—and then how Jesus caused Paul to break his relationship with his old religious ideas and to develop a new relationship with Jesus, the Messiah.

If you say that you're a Christian, and believe whole-heartedly in Jesus Christ as your Lord

and Saviour, then Scripture clearly teaches that you will go to heaven when you die. No questions asked. Of course, if you don't believe in Jesus or have a half-hearted attitude about your relationship with God, then there might be question as to where you will go when you die. Only God knows where you will end up on the Last Day.

This is why Jesus encourages you to develop a relationship with him—to become one of his disciples—so that he can teach you all that he wants you to know. After a time, then Jesus will encourage you to disciple someone else—to share what you know with someone else. To spend intentional time developing a relationship with someone else so that you can help that other person grow—in his or her faith and grow in other areas of his or her lives.

When you willingly offer your life as a sacrifice to God, then you are saying to God that you know that everything you have—including your body, mind and spirit—were all given to you by God. So when you willingly take up your cross every day and willingly follow Jesus, then you are living out the two Greatest Commandments—love God and love your neighbor as yourself.

And as you live out these two Greatest Commandments, then the Holy Spirit is equipping you to disciple someone else—or to be discipled by someone else. There is nothing wrong in learning from someone else. After all, that's how knowledge is passed on—one person teaching another person.

Of course, being discipled or discipling someone is not always easy, but it is well worth it. So what do you do when you feel weak and weary—when you are mentally and physically exhausted—and don't want to keep discipling someone? The answer: Pray. That's what you should do in any and every situation. So, when Jesus "...told his disciples, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me.²⁵ For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it.²⁶ For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?" (Matthew 16:24-26)

Jesus is serious when he talks about being one of his disciples. Jesus wants you to be all in. Jesus wants you to be 100% committed to following his teachings and his commandments. Jesus desires to be in a strong relationship with you. And when you continue to grow in your relationship with Jesus, then you are able to start nurturing and developing relationships with other people—people, who God brings into your life so that you can disciple them or they can disciple you.

This whole thing is a process, and it takes time. God has all the time in the world, and he invites you and me and all people to come to him and grow in your relationship with him. God the Father wants to teach you so much—he wants to disciple you in many ways—which is why he invites you to come to him and to join him in his ministry.

And after you continue nurturing your relationship with Jesus by filling up with His Holy Word, then you will be able to answer the question: Who is Jesus? Just like Peter's response. "Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' 14 And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, others say Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 15 He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' 16 Simon Peter replied, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.' 17 And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! (that is, Simon, son of Jonah) For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 16:13-17)

Pray and ask God to help you to fill up with His Holy Word every day. Pray and ask God to help you figure out who you can disciple or who can disciple you. Pray and ask God to give you the words to boldly proclaim that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God. Seek the Lord while he may be found. Call upon him while he is near. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Maturing in Christ: Called to Discipleship

During this Advent season (Nov. 28—Dec. 24), we're going to dig into the Scriptures to learn what God says about discipleship. Discipleship is being intentional about teaching someone else so that he or she can grow in his or her own faith. Teaching includes everything you do—how you act and react in every situation—and all that you say.

Every one of us in the church can and should participate in discipleship. Look at these encouraging instructions from Paul to Timothy: "Do not rebuke an older man but encourage him as you would a father, younger men as brothers, older women as mothers, younger women as sisters, in all purity." (1 Timothy 5:1-2)

Scripture also tells us how each group of people—older men, older women, young men and young women—should behave: "²Older men are to be sober-minded, dignified, self-controlled, sound in faith, in love, and in steadfastness. ³Older women likewise are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers or slaves to much wine. They are to teach what is good, ⁴ and so train the young women to love their husbands and children, ⁵ to be self-controlled, pure, working at home, kind, and submissive to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be reviled. ⁶Likewise, urge the younger men to be self-controlled." (Titus 2:2-6)

And one more encouragement for young men and women in the congregation: "Before old age you shall get up, and you shall show respect for an old person; and you shall revere your God; I am Yahweh." (Leviticus 19:32)

Everyone can and should disciple someone else. Discipleship starts with a willing heart. It also helps to do as Jesus encourages us: *"For this is the message that you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another."* (1 John 3:11)

As part of the Body of Christ, let us walk together as children of God, seeking to disciple each other. This is an exciting opportunity that we have during this Advent—Christmas Season as we prepare to receive from God the Father the greatest gift ever—eternal life through the one- and only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ.

We invite you to join us each Sunday at 9:30 a.m., and each Wednesday at 7 p.m. as we seek God to learn from him how to disciple other people. We also invite you to join us for the adult Bible class each Sunday after worship where we'll dig more into God's Word and talk about what discipleship looks like on a daily basis.

How to Disciple Fellow Church Members

First, you have to confess your sins and receive forgiveness. 2 Chronicles 7:14

Acknowledge that you aren't perfect, and need help from God. Read Psalm 51 and Psalm 32

Second, you have to read God's instructions for reaching people with the Good News about Jesus. "Marching Orders" in Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16

Third, you have to know who you are. Read Titus 2:1-8; 1 Peter 5:5-6 and Ephesians 6:1-3 Every person plays a different part in society.Paul talks about Spiritual gifts in 1 Corinthians 12:1-11 Then, he talks about each person in the church in 1 Corinthians 12:12-30

Fourth, you have to know how to live the way God wants you to live.

Matthew 5:15-16 Luke 9:23-26 John 8:31-32 Luke 14:25-27 John 13:34-35.
