

Sermon Title: John the Baptist's Purpose and Testimony Sermon Text: John 1:6-8, 19-28

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

We're now a little over a week away from celebrating the "big event"—the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The last two Sundays of Advent we have talked John's part in these events leading up to Jesus' birth.

Last Sunday we looked at John's ministry from Mark's perspective. Today we're going to look at John's ministry from his perspective. Our Gospel lesson sets the stage for us: "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. ⁸He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light." (John 1:6-8)

Last week we saw how the Prophet Isaiah and the Prophet Malachi preached about the coming Messiah. These prophets also preached about a man, who would come just before the Messiah. This man, who comes before Jesus, is John.

Part of John's ministry was to preach and baptize believers in the Jordan river. John was a messenger. "He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light." (John 1:7)

A messenger is one, who was sent by God, to carry out a specific task. John's ministry was to prepare the people to receive the Messiah. He did this by preaching using the Old Testament Scriptures. Some people thought John was the Messiah, who the Prophet Isaiah and the Prophet Malachi preached about.

But John was just a messenger. "⁷He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. ⁸He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light." (John 1:7)

John came as a witness. This is what he told the people, who came out to see what he was doing. ⁹ And this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?'.... ²⁰ He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, 'I am not the Christ.' ²¹ And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the Prophet?' And he answered, 'No.'" (John 1:9, 20-21)

John was simply a witness. He was simply the messenger trying to prepare the people to receive the Messiah, who was on his way. ²⁰ He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, 'I am not the Christ.' ²¹ And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the Prophet?' And he answered, 'No.'"

These folks couldn't understand, who John was—what role John was playing. The people, who were asking John were sent by the priests and Levites. These men probably knew the Scriptures or at least knew the general

message that one day God the Father would send the Messiah into this world to save all people from their sins.

John was not trying to pass himself off as the Messiah promised from the beginning of time. John was not trying to pass himself off as the Prophet Elijah. John was not trying to pass himself off as "the Prophet"—the man, who Moses preached about, who would come into this world—namely, Jesus.

John wasn't any of these people, and this is why it was confusing. The Scriptures are very clear that one day God the Father would send the Messiah, his only-begotten Son, into this world. This Messiah would restore order into a broken world.

And here was John, wearing a garment made of camels' hair tied with a leather belt. This John probably looked very shabby and unkempt. People might have been confused, because they couldn't understand how God could send a Messiah that looked like a homeless man.

So, these men who were sent to find out who John is and what he is doing, press him further. "²² So they said to him, 'Who are you? We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' ²³ He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said.'" (John 1:22-23)

The men, who came from the priests and Levites, had to have some answer to give. Simply saying—well, we don't know who he is or why he is here—wouldn't be sufficient. So, John then quotes the Prophet Isaiah as his answer: "²³ He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said.'" (Isaiah 40:3)

A cryptic answer. Yes. An answering describing his ministry. Yes. John was the messenger, who was sent before Jesus to prepare people to receive the message of hope and salvation found in Jesus Christ alone. "²³ He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said."" (Isaiah 40:3)

As the conversation continues, it's obvious that these guys aren't satisfied with that answer. "²⁴ (Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.) ²⁵ They asked him, 'Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?' ²⁶ John answered them, 'I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, ²⁷ even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie.' ²⁸ These things took place in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing." (John 1:24-28)

So as these men question John about WHO he is and WHAT he is doing—namely preaching and baptizing in the Jordan River. They start out by accusing him: "25 They asked him, 'Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?'"

Back in Matthew's Gospel, we read about John baptizing people. John's baptism was meant to get the people to repent of their sins—to convict them of what they have said or did against God and against someone else—and then to receive God's gracious forgiveness.

And once these people had confessed their sins, they would have received God's forgiveness. As they were baptized and confessed their sins, John stressed that it was God who had forgiven them and not him. "²⁶ John answered them, 'I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, ²⁷ even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie."" (John 1:26-27)

The main point of John's ministry was to point people to Jesus. Even as he was baptizing people and those believers were confessing their sins, John kept reminding people that they were forgiven because of Jesus—not

because of him.

Again, this is why "²⁶ John answered them, 'I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, ²⁷ even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." (John 1:26) John kept stressing that he was not the Messiah, and he was not forgiving sins. John even says that he is just as much as sinner as the folks around him, and he is not worthy to untie the Messiah's sandals.

Of course, someone in the crowd might have asked: Who is worthy to untie the Messiah's sandals? Well, other folks might have answered that only a really holy person—one who had clean hands and a pure heart.

But where do you find that person? You can search the world over and you'll never find that person, because "...all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴ and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus," (Romans 3:23-24)

John's ministry was to point people to Jesus. He did this by preaching from the Old Testament Scriptures and explaining what the Old Testament prophets had written down for our learning. John then baptized people so that they would confess their sins and receive God's gracious, life-giving forgiveness.

You and I aren't John the Baptist, but we still are given the opportunity to share the hope we have in Jesus. This opportunity is what Jesus gave to his disciples before he ascended into heaven—that is, the Great Commission

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20) Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

PARAMENTS ON OUR ALTAR:

Color is everywhere. Color is God's way of filling his world with beauty and giving pleasure to those who live in this colorful world. Christians, for centuries, have used color in divine worship to emphasize the redemptive action of God through his Son. Color's Purpose However, color and its bright message can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners, traditionally employed each Sunday, must be seen as more than an attempt to decorate, or give accent to the chancel. That is, no doubt, the view of some. It's true; interior design and decoration are important. But a greater service is demanded of our liturgical colors than merely making the surroundings "pretty." Furthermore, when altar paraments are used year after year without much attention given to their message, as well as their care, the pastor, along with his faithful altar guild would do well to throw away the key to the sacristy and refrain from using those altar cloth "decorations." Frequent instruction about the church year and its corresponding colors must go hand in hand with its weekly use

Color, like music, plays an important role in the life of God's worshiping people. Just as music is the "handmaiden to theology," liturgical color complements the message of the seasons and occasions during the church year. Taking a familiar seat in the nave of his/her chapel preceding worship on any given Sunday, the worshiper's emotions and intellect are immediately engaged by color. Liturgical colors aid in establishing a climate in which Law and Gospel may be heard and received.

Color allows us to see the Light of Life, Jesus Christ. It serves to communicate the message of salvation. And communicate it does when it reinforces a specific "colorful" chapter in the life of our Lord and his church, retold annually by the church calendar.

Symbolism of Colors It is appropriate, from time to time, to take a thoughtful and fresh look at the colors that are displayed throughout the church year. In the end, we admit, the use of paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners is an adiaphoron. Even the symbolism behind the traditional colors is somewhat arbitrary and open to additional interpretations as generations pass. The primary source and guarantor of their meanings is tradition. However, the important thing to remember is why we retain this traditional liturgical standard. The value of the "Bg-BgsPwr" color scheme rests in their purpose: to serve God's worshiping community by assisting in communicating the holy faith from generation to generation. In every age, the beauty and symbolism of color in the church continues to serve us exceptionally well!

Blue, the first color of the "Bg-Bgs-Pwr" scheme, is the more contemporary color increasingly used by many congregations in their observance of a new church year. Advent, a preparatory time of waiting and watching, communicates the message of hope. BLUE-the color of the sky-helps convey that powerful message. Our Christian faith rests on the hope that Christ, who came in history assuming our flesh, will also return on the last day of time from that same blue sky he ascended long ago. Author; Douglas K. 
FOR SHARING
