Sermon Title: Developing an Attitude of Thankfulness Sermon Text: Colossians 3:12-17

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

This past Advent season, we dug into the Scriptures to see what God has to say about discipleship. Discipleship is all about the relationship you have with someone else, and how you nurture that relationship so that you can teach that person what you know.

Of course, discipleship can also be the other way around. Maybe God is leading you to hang out with someone so that you can learn from that person—so that you can be discipled by that other person. And being a disciple may not sound glamorous, but it is a valuable situation to be in.

Our text for this First Sunday after Christmas gives us more valuable material to work with as we learn to be a disciple—particularly a disciple of Jesus Christ. From Colossians chapter three:

12 Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, 13 bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. 14 And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. 15 And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. 16 Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. 17 And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:12-17)

Today's text is a great example of how plain and simple the teachings of Jesus are. Some people want to make the teachings of Jesus Christ complicated—as though you have to become an expert in the Old Testament laws in order to fully understand what God is telling you.

But that's wrong. It's true that there are places in Scripture that seem to be confusing or seem to contradict other parts of Scripture, but one thing is absolutely true—that Scripture ALWYAYS interprets Scripture. So if one passage seems to contract another passage, then you need to look for more passages that talk about that specific thing and those other passages will help you understand what you are reading. If you need help understanding two portions of Scripture that seem to contradict each other, then please come talk to me. I'll be happy to work with you to understand that portion of Scripture.

When you say that you're a Christian, then you are saying that you are a disciple of Jesus Christ. A disciple wants to learn from someone else. Of course, if God has placed you in a different

role, then God wants you to disciple someone else so that person can learn to do what you do.

¹² Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, ¹³ bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive."

Paul starts each of his letter addressing fellow believers in Jesus Christ, acknowledging who they are—they are God's chosen people, who are HOLY and BELOVED by God our Heavenly Father. Paul then concludes that the disciples of Jesus Christ—the followers of Jesus—have "... compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience..."

Paul also continues this letter by encouraging them to live at peace with one another, and to restore any broken relationships: ¹³ bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive."

Now, Paul knows that the believers in Colossae have also sinned and have fallen short of God's glory, but he also knows that these same believers have been redeemed by the shed blood of Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, I've met some Christians, who have fixed firmly in their mind that they will never talk to a certain person again, because that person hurt them in the past. That sort of attitude actually is completely contrary to God and His Holy Word. Paul tells us that we should live at peace with one another as best as we are able to do. That isn't always easy, but all things are possible with the help of God Almighty.

is bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." We are encouraged to forgive other people when they have hurt us, because Paul reminds us that God has forgiven you the sins that you have committed, and therefore you should also forgive the person, who has hurt you. "as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive."

Paul goes on to encourage the disciples of Jesus Christ in Colossae: ¹⁴ And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. ¹⁵ And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful."

Paul stated this text acknowledging that the Christians at Colossae are children of God, and wrote to them as though they were already living the way Paul is encouraging them to do. After Paul encourages fellow Christians to reconcile with one another, he encourages us Christians to love others with the love of Jesus as we interact with one another.

As you love others with the love of Jesus, then you will experience the peace of God which surpasses all understanding. In addition to experiencing God's peace, Paul encourages all disciples of Jesus Christ to "be thankful." Elsewhere in his other New Testament letters, Paul encourages Christians to be thankful and to give thanks in all situations.

Being thankful in every situation doesn't mean being fake—putting on a happy face and concluding that everything will go well. That won't work. When you live by filling up with Jesus and experiencing his love which surpasses all understanding, then you will experience God's peace—his joy—his thankful attitude.

This year, I heard on some Christian radio the idea of a "Thirty Days of Gratitude Challenge." The idea is that every day for a month, you write down what you are grateful for—or what you are thankful for. When you actually spend a little time every day thinking about what or who you are

grateful for, then you will slowly start developing a better attitude. This sort of intentional "Thirty Days of Gratitude Challenge" can actually grow into a habit of simply finding something every day to be thankful for.

This is why Paul also includes this short sentence: "And be thankful." Find a reason every day to be thankful. Write it down in a journal or on your phone, and see what God does in your life as a result of you working to develop a better attitude.

As you work to grow an attitude of being thankful by the help of the Holy Spirit in you, you are growing as a disciple of Jesus Christ. Paul continues: ¹⁶ Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. ¹⁷ And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:16 -17)

I like it when Scripture teaches what I've been saying—how important it is to fill up with the truth of God's Word, and let that truth of God's Word lead and guide you in the way you should go each day. ¹⁶ Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God."

Paul here is telling the Christians at Colossae—and us Christians here today—that we should let God's Word live in us. And when we let God's Word live in us, then we are able to teach someone else—we are able to disciple someone else, "...teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God."

The only truth that you need to teach someone else is the truth from God's Word. The truth of God's Word is found not only in the Bible, but it is also found in Contemporary Christian songs and in traditional hymns. The truth of God's Word is found in an audio format so you can listen to the Bible while you driving to work—driving up to Sioux City—or simply while lounging on the couch.

As you fill up with the truth of God's Word, you will slowly develop an attitude of thankfulness—acknowledging all that God has done for you and your family and friends. Granted, it is not always easy to be thankful, but with God ALL THINGS are possible. This means that with the help of the Holy Spirit living in you, you are able to grow as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Seek the Lord while he may be found. Call upon him while he is near. To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

PARIMENTS

White is the color of purity and completeness. The theme for the "great fifty days" of Easter is supported by the use of white. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, assists in bearing the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy.

In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in *Lutheran Service Book*. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.







Our Banners used in Service

It is interesting to note how often Jesus used symbols to illustrate heavenly truths in His teaching. He said: "I am the Light of the world" (John 8:12 RSV). ""Consider the lilies of the field" (Matthew 6:28 RSV). "I am the true Vine" (John:6 RSV). "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field" (Matthew 13:44 RSV). "I am the Good Shepherd" (John 10:11 RSV).

Symbols are the language of Christian art. Since the beginning of the Christin church, religious symbolism has developed as a means by which Christians identify with one another and share their beliefs. Many symbols of the early church remain in art today as visible signs through which an artist is able to impart their understanding of God.



The **Crown** represents the Kingship of Jesus Christ and His place of honor at the right hand of God. A seven-pointed Crown highlights the number seven, which is used 735 times in the Bible. Seven symbolizes completeness and perfection. Although this crown only has 3-points. A symbol of the divine nature of Jesus Christ. A crown also can be used to denote our status as heirs of heaven.

The king's crown was a symbol of his representative rule of the kingdom that was ultimately ruled by God, God is the only true authority, the everlasting King. One day we will see Christ with many crowns on his head, an image of his ultimate authority (Rev 19:12).
