Isaiah 61:10—62:3 / Psalm 111 / Galatians 4:4–7 / Luke 2:22–40

Sermon Title: God's Word Never Fails Sermon Text: Luke 2:22-40

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

Even though the rest of the secular world has stopped listening to Christmas music on the radio, and some folks have taken down their Christmas decorations, the Christian church recognizes that the actual Christmas season runs from Christmas Day until January 5—a total of TWELVE DAYS. That's what the song with the same name is talking about—the twelve days of the actual Christmas Season.

So, Merry Christmas! We just celebrated the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ two days ago. Today is the First Sunday after Christmas, and our Gospel reading jumps ahead to Jesus as a baby being presented at the temple according to the Law of Moses.

22 And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord 23 (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, 'Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord' [Exodus 13:2, 12]) 24 and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons.' [Leviticus 12:8]" (Luke 2:22-24)

According to the Law of Moses written in Exodus and Leviticus, after a baby was born, the parents were to take the baby to the temple in Jerusalem and offer a sacrifice to God on behalf of the child. The sacrifice was acknowledging that all life comes from God—and that God makes all things holy.

In the Book of Exodus, God told the Israelites that every first-born baby—boys and girls—is considered holy. According to the Law of Moses, the parents of that child need to offer a sacrifice to make the mother clean once again, since the process of giving birth made the mother unclean.

The woman, who gave birth "shall bring to the priest at the entrance of the tent of meeting a lamb a year old for a burnt offering, and a pigeon or a turtledove for a sin offering, and he shall offer it before the LORD and make atonement for her." (Leviticus 12:6-7)

So Mary and Joseph were already near Jerusalem to be counted in the census. They had their first-born baby—Jesus in the nearby town of Bethlehem. And, according to Leviticus 12:3: "And on the eighth day the flesh of his foreskin shall be circumcised."

Eight days after Jesus was born, he was circumcised. God instituted circumcision back when he changed Abram's name to Abraham. "You shall be circumcised in the flesh of your foreskins, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and you." (Genesis 17:11) This covenant that God made with Abraham is that he would lead and guide Abraham and his family all the days of their lives. This covenant was also a sign for every single person, who was born to Abraham—all his biological descendants and all of his spiritual descendants.

This covenant was assurance to Abraham and to all of us that when God says he will do something, you can 2

know for a rock-solid fact that thing will happen just as God said it would. Circumcision was also a covenant between God and man, reminding man how serious our relationship is between God and us.

So Mary and Joseph go to the temple in Jerusalem on the day that Jesus turned eight days old. "25 Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. 26 And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ." (Luke 2:25-26)

A devout believer in the One True God, who would send the Messiah into this world to save his people from going to hell, was hanging around the temple. Scripture tells us that Simeon was "...righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel." Back in the Prophet Isaiah, we read about waiting expectantly for the coming Messiah. The Prophet Isaiah says: "It will be said on that day, 'Behold, this is our God; we have waited for him, that he might save us. This is the LORD; we have waited for him; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation." (Isaiah 25:9)

Some could say that Simeon was NOT a regular guy, because he acted very religious. That's not true. Simeon WAS just a regular guy, who Scripture points out that he lived the way God desires of us. Simeon didn't do anything extra special to be considered "...righteous and devout...." He was considered this, because of the work of the Holy Spirit in Simeon's life. And every one of you here today, who believes in Jesus Christ, is also considered righteous in God's eyes, because of what Jesus did for you through his death and resurrection.

26 And it had been revealed to him—that is, Simeon—by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ." We don't know how old Simeon was, but he was likely an older man. And Gold told him that before he died, he would get to see with his own eyes the Messiah promised from of old. And even though many years passed before Simeon got to see the Messiah—baby Jesus—Simeon believed whole-heartedly that what God told him that it was true and that it would most definitely happen.

What about you? Do you have that same conviction? Do you believe God 100% of the time or do you also trust your gut instincts at the same time? When you fill up with Jesus, then you will know the truth of God more. When you pray and confess your sins. When you receive God's gracious, life-giving forgiveness, then God will forgive you. When you confess your sins, then you are more open and receptive to hearing and listening to God the Holy Spirit like Simeon.

"And [Simeon] came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, 28 he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said, 'Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; 30 for my eyes have seen your salvation 31 that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, 32 a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel.'" (Luke 2:27-32)

When Joseph and Mary came into the temple to have their first-born baby son circumcised, the Holy Spirit prompted Simeon and he went and found the young couple. As soon as Simeon laid eyes on the baby Jesus, Simeon grabbed up the child and was so overcome with joy that he praised God with these words:

"'Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; 30 for my eyes have seen your salvation 31 that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, 32 a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel.'" (Luke 2:29-32)

Simeon's song—or as it's called in the liturgy—the Nunc Dimittis—is what we sing at the end of our worship service. It's appropriate that we sing his song at the end of our worship service, because in worship we, too, have see

the Messiah--in his Holy Word and in Holy Communion.

The Holy Spirit prompted Simeon to sing this song right after he was holding baby Jesus in his arms. "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; 30 for my eyes have seen your salvation 31 that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, 32 a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel. " (Luke 2:29-32)

Simeon was no only singing out of his own joy, but he was also prophesying about what would happen. Jesus came not only to save Jews, but to save ALL people. And why do all people need to be saved? Aren't all people pretty good?

Well, if you subscribe to current thought—then all people are pretty good. But that isn't what God says: "For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." (Romans 3:22b-24)

Every one of us has sinned, and do not measure up to God's standards. And this is exactly why baby Jesus was born, to fix this terrible problem. Jesus was born, lived a perfect life, was killed and then raised from the dead three days later in order to make us holy and right in God's eyes. This is why Jesus was born.

So, there we find Joseph and Mary, and Simeon, who they do not know, holding their baby boy and prophesying about Jesus' purpose. "33 And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. 34 And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed 35 (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from *many hearts may be revealed.* " (Luke 2:33-35)

Joseph and Mary are most likely a little confused as to what Simeon is saying and doing, and yet, they are not totally repulsed by what is happening. After all, this is the same couple, who were told by an angel about how Jesus would be born.

34 And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed." Here Simeon is already prophesying about how Jesus' life will impact the rest of the world. Simeon is simply remembering a couple of passages from the Prophet Isaiah, which talk about Jesus being a cornerstone to those who believe in him, and a stumbling bock for those who don't believe in him.

And this conflict continues today, and will continue until the day when Jesus returns one last time. This conflict of whether Jesus is real and you should believe in him, or he is simply a fairy tale. Even though I can't make you believe in Jesus, I can encourage you to do so when I share with you the hope I have in Jesus.

Simeon believed wholeheartedly in God. He trust in God and waited—probably many years—to see God's plan unfold. Simeon got to see the promised Messiah, holding that new-born baby in his arms, praising God for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Simeon knew that now that he had seen baby Jesus, he was ready to die and go be with God in heaven.

Cling to the promises of God in his Word just as Simeon did. What God says is rock-solid truth. You can take him at his Word. "Blessed be the LORD who has given rest to his people Israel, according to all that he promised. Not one word has failed of all his good promise, which he spoke by Moses his servant." (1 Kings 8:56) To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

PARAMENTS ON OUR ALTAR:

Color is everywhere. Color is God's way of filling his world with beauty and giving pleasure to those who live in this colorful world. Christians, for centuries, have used color in divine worship to emphasize the redemptive action of God through his Son. Color's Purpose However, color and its bright message can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners, traditionally employed each Sunday, must be seen as more than an attempt to decorate, or give accent to the chancel. That is, no doubt, the view of some. It's true; interior design and decoration are important. But a greater service is demanded of our liturgical colors than merely making the surroundings "pretty." Furthermore, when altar paraments are used year after year without much attention given to their message, as well as their care, the pastor, along with his faithful altar guild would do well to throw away the key to the sacristy and refrain from using those altar cloth "decorations." Frequent instruction about the church year and its corresponding colors must go hand in hand with its weekly use

Color, like music, plays an important role in the life of God's worshiping people. Just as music is the "handmaiden to theology," liturgical color complements the message of the seasons and occasions during the church year. Taking a familiar seat in the nave of his/her chapel preceding worship on any given Sunday, the worshiper's emotions and intellect are immediately engaged by color. Liturgical colors aid in establishing a climate in which Law and Gospel may be heard and received.

Color allows us to see the Light of Life, Jesus Christ. It serves to communicate the message of salvation. And communicate it does when it reinforces a specific "colorful" chapter in the life of our Lord and his church, retold annually by the church calendar.

Symbolism of Colors It is appropriate, from time to time, to take a thoughtful and fresh look at the colors that are displayed throughout the church year. In the end, we admit, the use of paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners is an adiaphoron. Even the symbolism behind the traditional colors is somewhat arbitrary and open to additional interpretations as generations pass. The primary source and guarantor of their meanings is tradition. However, the important thing to remember is why we retain this traditional liturgical standard. The value of the "Bg-BgsPwr" color scheme rests in their purpose: to serve God's worshiping community by assisting in communicating the holy faith from generation to generation. In every age, the beauty and symbolism of color in the church continues to serve us exceptionally well!


White is the color of purity and completeness. The theme for the "great fifty days" of Easter is supported by the use of white. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, assists in bearing the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy. In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in *Lutheran Service Book*. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.


FOR SHARING






