St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Zechariah 9:9–12 / Psalm 145:1–14 / Romans 7:14–25a / Matthew 11:25–30

> Sermon Title: Wisdom and Comfort from Jesus Sermon Text: Matthew 11:25-30

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

²⁵ At that time Jesus declared, 'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that you have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to little children; ²⁶ yes, Father, for such was your gracious will." (Matthew 11:25-26)

In our Gospel lesson for today, Jesus thanks his Father in heaven—and our Father in heaven—for revealing the truths of the Scripture *"to little children."* Now, in this case, Jesus isn't just talking about actual children—Jesus is also talking about people, who receive the Gospel with a simple, child-like faith.

Sometimes as Christians, we like to make things really difficult and complicated. Instead of making the truths of God's Word complicated, we should just receive the truth of God's Word like a child does—as a matter of fact.

When Jesus was looking for disciples, he didn't go to the chief priests, the scribes or the Pharisees to see if they would follow him. Instead, Jesus asks 12 average blue-collar workers to follow him. Men, who would not be considered of great importance.

So now in his prayer in Matthew chapter 11 Jesus thanks God the Father for revealing the truth of the Gospel to those, who have a child-like faith—who don't make things complicated—they just accept the truth as the truth.

Now, it's true that all of Jesus' disciples struggled at different times to believe. And that's okay. Because Jesus never says—you have to believe this long list of rules—otherwise, you're out! Instead, Jesus wants you to simply trust him—to believe that he knows what is best for your life—and that he will never lead you astray.

Throughout history we read about people, who claimed that you had to figure out the Scriptures from man's point of view. That will never lead you to the truth. When you rely on man's wisdom—you'll never understand the truth from God's Word.

This is where the Holy Spirit works in your life. The Holy Spirit will teach you all that Jesus wants you to know. The Holy Spirit gives you God's Wisdom—not man's wisdom—to understand the truths from the Bible.

The Prophet Isaiah talks about man's wisdom verses God's Wisdom: "...and the wisdom of the wise men shall perish, and the discernment of the discerning men shall be hidden." (Isaiah 29:14)

And Paul talks about man's wisdom compared to God's Wisdom in First Corinthians: "For the wisdom of this world is folly with God. For it is written, 'He catches the wise in their craftiness,' and again, 'The Lord knows the thoughts of the wise, that they are futile." (1 Corinthians 3:19-20)

And, "For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, ²³ but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, ²⁴ but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵ For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men." (1 Corinthians 1:22-25)

All throughout history we can read about people, who don't believe in God. Instead, some people, who are recorded in the Book of Ephesians, spent all their time focusing on the things that could be proved by human standards. If an idea couldn't be proven by human standards, then it wasn't true.

That's pretty limiting, if you think about it. God is so much greater than anything you and me could ever come up with. God created this world with so much detail that no human could ever come up with things like our DNA—like the way that our skin and body heals after it's cut—or the way some plants propagate.

From Psalm 19: "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork. Day to day pours out speech, and night to night reveals knowledge. There is no speech, nor are there words, whose voice is not heard. Their voice goes out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world." (Psalm 19:1-4)

Jesus continues praying in our Gospel lesson from Matthew 11: "²⁷ All things have been handed over to me by my Father, and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him." (Matthew 11:25-27)

Here Jesus prays and thanks God the Father in Heaven that the truth of His Word has been given initially to people, who have a child-like faith. Then, Jesus prays and thanks God that God the Father has given him all authority in heaven and on earth.

Of course, the authority of Jesus has been questioned by many people throughout history. Some people have trouble believing that Jesus is the source of EVERYTHING—including life! And yet, those same people want to accept that human beings came into existence by evolving from a single-cell organism? Talk about a fantastic fictional story!

In this prayer in Matthew 11, Jesus also prays and thanks God the Father that people only get to heaven through himself. When you know the Son then you will know the Father. It's that simple. There is no other way to get to heaven than by believing in Jesus. And when you know Jesus then you know God your Heavenly Father.

Then, Jesus concludes his pray with an invitation: "²⁸ Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰ For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

As we continue living with Covid-19, life can seem draining and exhausting, but thanks be to God that we don't have to live life alone. Instead, Jesus promised that after he ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father, he would send the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit comforts us when we are hurting or sad. The Holy Spirit reminds us of the promises in the Bible that Jesus is with us ALWAYS. The Holy Spirit teaches us what the Bible says about all kinds of things that relate to our daily life.

Jesus invites you to come to him. Come and you will find rest in Jesus. Jesus gives you rest that the world cannot give. Jesus also gives you peace with surpassing all understanding. Jesus also gives you joy that fills you up so that you can share that joy with someone else, who needs a little joy from Jesus. To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.
