St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Mapleton, IA Deuteronomy 7:6–9 / Psalm 125 / Romans 8:28–39 / Matthew 13:44–52

> Sermon Title: What is Most Valuable to You? Sermon Text: Matthew 13:44-52

"Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, and our LORD Jesus Christ." (2 Tim. 1:2) Amen.

This morning, we're going to look at four short parables. "A parable is a simple story illustrating a moral lesson." (The American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language, 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition) When you hear a parable, you might just hear the words and think that it was a cute little story, nothing more. Other people will hear the same parable, and recognize that the story has a deeper meaning.

<sup>44</sup> "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. <sup>45</sup> "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls, <sup>46</sup> who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it." (Matthew 13:44-46)

In both of these parables, Jesus tells us that no matter what you value and cherish in this world—NOTHING can compare with the even greater joy and satisfaction that we will experience in the presence of Jesus in heaven.

You can't take your stuff with you when you die. This is why you never see a hearse pulling a U-haul trailer. We should remember that all that own, we have we received from God. This is what we sing in the hymn "We Give Thee But Thine Own," #781 in our hymnal. Verse 1: "We give Thee but Thine own, // Whate'er the gift may be; // All that we have is Thine alone, // A trust, O Lord, from Thee."

When we acknowledge that everything we have comes from God—then we are thinking correctly—we recognize who is ultimately in control of our lives. This is also what we confess in the Apostles' Creed: the First Article:

"I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth. What does this mean? I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life." (Small Catechism: Apostles' Creed)

"<sup>44</sup> "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. <sup>45</sup> "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls, <sup>46</sup> who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it." (Matthew 13:44-46)

In these two short parables, think about the man, who found the treasure hidden in a field, and the merchant searching for fine pearls, as Jesus. Jesus is always searching for us. God "...desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. <sup>5</sup> For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." (1 Timothy 2:4-5)

Jesus looks for a hidden treasure or for fine pearls—which are us. We are valuable and extremely important in God's eyes. God wants us to be with him in heaven for all eternity. And in these two parables, both men do some?

thing extreme—they sell everything that they have to buy these precious items.

And this is exactly what Jesus has done for us. Jesus loves you more than you can ever imagine, and he has done more FOR YOU than you could ever imagine. Jesus "...gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time." (1 Timothy 2:6)

<sup>16</sup> "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. <sup>17</sup> For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." (John 3:16-17)

God did this FOR YOU! God loves you more than you can ever imagine and he wants—he longs for you to be wit him in heaven for all eternity.

"<sup>47</sup> "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and gathered fish of every kind. <sup>48</sup> When it was full, men drew it ashore and sat down and sorted the good into containers but threw away the bad. <sup>49</sup> So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous <sup>50</sup> and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (Matthew 13:47-50)

This parable talks about the Last Day, when Jesus will come. At that time Jesus will separate the sheep from the goats—the righteous from the wicked. The righteous will go with Jesus into heaven, and the wicked will be sent away from Jesus and his presence into hell.

Here when Jesus talks about gathering fish, he is talking about calling all people to himself to be with him forever. "After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him, two by two, into every town and place where he himself was about to go. <sup>2</sup> And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. <sup>3</sup> Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves." (Luke 10:1-3)

In Luke 10, Jesus goes on to explain what those disciples are to do. Jesus wants more people to go out into this world to share the hope they have in Jesus with other people, who don't know Jesus. Do you take every opportunity that God gives you to share the hope you have in Jesus? It can be hard sharing your faith in Jesus to other people, but God gives you the strength through the Holy Spirit to tell someone else what Jesus has done in your life.

And at the end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus then invites ALL people, who believe in him, to participate in the Great Commission: <sup>18</sup> And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup> Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

Jesus continues with another parable: <sup>51</sup> "Have you understood all these things?" They said to him, "Yes." <sup>52</sup> And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like a master of a house, who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old." (Matthew 13:51-52)

I remember several years ago I had a conversation with a friend of mine, who had joined the Mormons. He asked me if I thought that the Old Testament was important. I told him that is very important. To think that the Old Testament is old and therefore unnecessary is not correct. Without the Old Testament, we wouldn't know the complete story that is finished in the New Testament.

When Jesus encourages us who are his disciples to "bring out of his treasure what is new and what is old," we are to share both the Law and the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is how some people can get bristly. Some people

only want to know the feel-good stuff of the Bible, but don't want to know or acknowledge the unpleasant stuff—the Law—the Ten Commandments. Some people want to think only of God as a senile grandpa rocking in his chair, patting you on the head and telling you that you're doing well—even when you have done wrong.

That is not who God is. God is greater than anything you can think about him. God knows what is going on in your heart long before you think about it or speak it. The more you read the Bible, the more you will start understanding who God is—his character—his personality.

Now, granted, no matter how much you study the Bible and learn more about God, you will never be proficient in knowing everything about God. That would be impossible. But God invites you daily to come to him—to pray and confess your sins—and then receive his gracious forgiveness.

Then, pray and ask God to help you to understand him—or at least to understand some part of Scripture that you were just reading. Paul talks a lot about studying the Bible in the books First and Second Timothy and Titus.

From Second Timothy: <sup>4</sup> But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it <sup>15</sup> and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus." (2 Timothy 3:14-15)

"the sacred writings"—that is, the Bible—"are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. "When you become "acquainted with the sacred writings" then you will know the truth. When you know the truth about Jesus, then you will be living the way God asks you. When you fill up with Jesus then you can easily pour out to others.


One way to become "acquainted with the sacred writings" is to read or listen to the Bible every day. Develop a habit. We all have habits that we know we should change. Make a change in your own life and develop a habit of digging into God's Word.

The more you dig into God's Word, the more you will uncover hidden treasurers or pearls of great value. The Bible is full of nuggets of meaty goodness. It's just waiting for you to discover it. As the prophet Isaiah says:

6 "Seek the LORD while he may be found; call upon him while he is near." (Isaiah 55:6) To God be the glory now and forever. Amen.

Now, may the peace of God which transcends all understanding guard and keep your hearts in Christ Jesus. Amen.

I've said it before, and I'll probably say it again. Prayer and Bible reading and/or listening are so very important to the life of a Christian. # **Neither Height Nor Depth**

Romans 8:38-39



For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:38–39)

#### FOR SHARING

- 1. Have you ever felt separated from God and His love? When? Why?
- 2. St. Paul says in **Romans 8:37:** "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us." With pen in hand underline all the powers that St. Paul says Christ has conquered.
- 3. "Neither height nor depth...will be able to separate us from the love of God." St. Paul is referring to the belief that astrological powers somehow influences events and behavior. What evidence do you see that many people, including Christians, sometimes have difficulty believing that heavenly bodies don't somehow influence their lives (e.g., superstition about Friday the 13th, reading the horoscope)? However, what does God's Word clearly proclaim about the influence of stars and other heavenly bodies? About "anything else in all creation"?
- 4. To be in Christ is to share His victory over all these powers. Read aloud another victory hymn of St. Paul's:

"Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Cor. 15:54–57)

#### PRAYER

Heavenly Father, God of victories, we come to You,

to thank You for the victories You have given us over life and death; angels and demons; the present and the future; powers, height, and depth; and anything else in all creation;

to ask Your forgiveness for the times we have felt separated from You, for the times we have felt less than victorious over some of the worldly

to ask Your help in all that we do so that we might be "more than conquerors through Him who loved us." In the name of Jesus. Amen.


