

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As we enter the Easter season this month we have the joy of remembering the Resurrection of Christ. St Paul emphasizes for us the importance of the resurrection in 1 Corinthians. There he writes,

"And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins." -1 Cor. 15:17

If it weren't for the resurrection of Christ, our faith in Him would be meaningless. After all our faith is founded on the one who innocently suffered and died for our sins. We celebrate this on Good Friday (not to be confused with Black Friday, although even I am guilty of mixing up these two). The sinless Son of God suffering for the sins of the whole world, that we might have peace with God.

His suffering and death was the sacrifice made once for all. The writer of Hebrews affirms this when he writes,

"But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the ages to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself." - Heb 9:26b Jesus put away all our sins when He gave Himself as the sacrifice for us. Later the writer of Hebrews connects Jesus to the ancient priesthood calling Jesus the High Priest who offered up the perfect sacrifice. This is why Good Friday is such an important holiday. It focuses our attention on the sacrifice made to make atonement, or pay for, our sins.

However, all Christ suffered on Good Friday would have meant nothing if not for Easter Sunday. Returning to St Paul's words from 1 Corinthians 15, Christ rose as the first fruits of those who are raised. But if even He was not raised then we are all lost. But Jesus tells us Himself that He came to give His life as a ransom for many in both Matthew 20 and Mark 10. And His resurrection serves as proof to all of us that that ransom was sufficient payment.

Easter Sunday gives us hope. It assures us of the hope of eternal life. The hope that those who die in the faith will rise again. Easter gives us the comfort of knowing that though death may seem to have a temporary victory, Christ has the final victory as He emerges triumphant from the grave.

We celebrate Easter because His victory is our victory. By faith in Christ we have the hope of eternal life with Him. And together we look forward to the day when God raises us and all believers in Christ. St Paul states,

"For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." - Rom. 6:5

In baptism we have been united with Him in His death. That we might also be united with Him in His resurrection. Our sins died with Christ as they were drowned in the baptismal waters that together we might look forward to being raised with Christ, just as He was.

Easter is a time for celebration because Christ who was slain for us is raised to life. Our faith is not in the dead, but in the living Christ. Lent and Easter offer such beautiful contrasts. Throughout the season of Lent we consider our sinfulness and just how unworthy we are to receive any of God's gifts. We set aside much of the praise and joy for penitence and reflection. Then on Easter, the joy breaks forth in shouts of "Alleluia!" and "Christ is risen!" And this is all because we know that His resurrection proves, as St Paul states, that our faith is not in vain.

The Early Church moved the day of worship to Sunday as a way to remember and celebrate the resurrection of Christ regularly because they knew the hope, comfort, and joy that Jesus resurrection brings to us all. May God fill us with this joy and comfort this joyful Eastertide and throughout our lives. In Christ,

From the Vicar John Stacy

Greetings in Christ:

It was just about a year ago that District President Steven Turner phoned me at my home in Des Moines and told me that he had three congregations in Iowa District West that may be interested in having me as a Specific Ministry Pastor. The congregations were in Corning, Newell and Mapleton. After a brief discussion he said: "I think Mapleton would be the best fit for you. If it's ok with you, I will contact their Circuit Counselor Pastor Salcedo and have him meet with their Elders and Boards and arrange a meeting."

On a Sunday in early April, I came to Mapleton for the first time and met with a group of members. After two hours of questions and answers, Elder Chair, Ryan Paulson told me we will have a congregational meeting putting you forth with our endorsement to serve as our SMP Pastor, with the intent that once you are ordained you will become our permanent pastor. I heard back from Ryan over a week later that the congregation had approved their recommendation.

There is much more to the story above. Above all else this has been a 6 year journey for me. The Fall of 2017 I had decided to pursue Pastoral Ministry once I had retired from Drake University. This left me a good three years to think through my decision and to begin the Concordia enrollment requirements.

During this time, I met with Pastor Eugene Krueger, from Shepherd of the Valley, in West Des Moines who had went through the SMP Program late in his life. He said something to me that has remained with me to this day. "When God wants you, He will call, and you will know."

It is my hope throughout this Easter season that you too will recall Pastor Krueger's words. God wants all of us for Himself. That was accomplished by his son's death and resurrection. Our faith in Jesus Christ as our savior assures us that God has indeed brought all of us to himself.

Our mantra throughout the Easter Season is: "Christ is Risen, He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!"

Each night I thank God for this opportunity, and for the congregation, that has brought and accepted me into their community. As most of you know by now, beginning April 7, I will no longer be doing services at St. Paul, Ute. I will be at Saint Matthews each Sunday. Pastor Peitsch will be here for communion Sundays working by my side.

White is the color of purity and completeness. The theme for the "great fifty days" of Easter is supported by the use of white. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, assists in bearing the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy.

In addition to its use during Eastertide, white is the appointed color for such festive Sundays as Christmas and its twelve days; Epiphany (Jan. 6) and the first Sunday following it, observed as the Baptism of Our Lord; the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, also known as Transfiguration Sunday; Holy Trinity Sunday; and twenty-one minor festivals and occasions listed on the church year calendar in *Lutheran Service Book*. In all, white serves as the best festive color for the church year.

Color's Purpose

However, color and its bright message can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes, banners, traditionally employed each Sunday, must be seen as more than an attempt to decorate, or give accent to the chancel. That is, no doubt, the view of some. It's true; interior design and decoration are important. But a greater service is demanded of our liturgical colors than merely making the surroundings "pretty."

Furthermore, when altar paraments are used year after year without much attention given to their message, as well as their care, the pastor, along with his faithful altar guild would do well to throw away the key to the sacristy and refrain from using those altar cloth "decorations."

Frequent instruction about the church year and its corresponding colors must go hand in hand with its weekly use.

WHAT IS LWML SUNDAY?

raditionally, the first Sunday in October is set aside for the observation of LWML Sunday, but it may be celebrated at any time. Here are some interesting facts according to the LWML history book, *Women IN God's Service, WINGS**.

- During the 12th Biennial Convention in Washington, D.C. July 18–20, 1967 (Eula Hankel, President), a resolution was passed designating the first Sunday in October as LWML Sunday. On Sunday, October 1, 1967, the first LWML Sunday was held. A letter to all pastors and societies was released to explain that "LWML Sunday was to be a window through which could be seen the marvelous opportunities the Lord gives the women of the church to be in mission and serve in His Name." Pastors were asked to have a prayer for LWML, and some prayer thoughts were included.
- In 1968, an informational brochure, *Serve the Lord with Gladness*, was produced as part of LWML Sunday.
- In 1973, three-fourths of all societies observed LWML Sunday.
- Beginning in 1975, bulletin covers were distributed for LWML Sunday and in 1976, a children's activity page was added to LWML Sunday resources.
- Past LWML Sunday materials are archived on the LWML website, beginning with 2008, and can be found at *lwml.org/lwml-sunday-archives*.

If you would like to participate in our Mite Box program, there are small mite boxes on the back table for you to take home and put your small change in. Bring it to church (empty it into the large mite box) anytime or on the 4th Sunday of the month (Mission Sunday). Then take it home and fill it again. These mites will join with mites from Mapleton Zone and then on to district to meet our Mission Grant goal.




CHURCH LIBRARY




BIBLE WORD SQUARES




